As Malverne continues to maintain its exemplary financial position with auditors, we are again very excited to present to you a 2018-19 school budget that comes in UNDER our New York State tax cap number. We are committed to maintaining our quality of program and offerings while minimizing costs to the taxpayers, and are proud to live in a community where our students are thriving, our facilities are always improving, and our financial ratings are strong.

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE PROPOSED 2018-19 BUDGET INCLUDE:

- Maintenance of all academic programs.
- Expansion of our technology initiatives and infrastructure upgrades.
- More than \$1.3 million to be applied from fund balance/ reserves to reduce the tax levy burden to residents.
- Expansion of our Advanced Placement program offerings, including AP Capstone.
- Security system upgrades, including containment areas at each school's main entrance and an advanced entry system for all staff.
- Continued building and site improvements, districtwide.

As we continue to maintain our investment in our buildings, we have a second and third proposition on the ballot for voters, which carry NO additional impact to taxpayers. More information on these can be found on page 2.

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Propositions to ENHANCE

Over the past few years, the district has invested in many needed improvements to its facilities. Each of the projects has been funded through the use of capital reserve funds, which are monies saved specifically for the purpose of making updates and renovations to the infrastructure of our school buildings.

Voter approval is required

whenever a district seeks to utilize funds from its capital reserve. The passage of Propositions #2 and #3 simply enables the Board of Education to utilize money that the district has already saved and results in NO ADDITIONAL **COST TO THE TAXPAYER.** Also, Proposition #2 is state-aidable at a reimbursement rate of 52%.



MALVERNE GETS MORE FOR ITS MONEY: For every \$1 we spend in capital improvements, the state reimburses us \$0.52.

PROPOSITION #2: Capital Reserve Expenditure

The Board of Education seeks approval to expend \$1.6 million from the Capital Reserve Fund II to perform necessary capital work districtwide.

THE PROPOSED EXPENDITURES FOR THESE MONIES ARE:

- Districtwide field work
- Districtwide site improvements
- Purchase of a large bus


These much-needed upgrades will continue to ensure the safety of our students and staff and would otherwise need to be funded through the annual budget. NOTE: Money in this reserve account CANNOT be used to offset the tax levy.

TAX LEVY: The levy is the amount of money that is needed to meet the school district budget after applying State Aid and other income. In total, the amount needed for expenses from taxpayers is increasing by \$1,153,876 or 2.75%. Individual homeowners' tax increases will vary in dollar amount based on their home. Factors that affect the individual school taxes are: shift in assessment values; reassessment of properties; changes in proportions of tax responsibilities, including a shift of the tax responsibility from commercial property and utilities to single-family homeowners (not controlled by the school district); and changes in STAR tax reduction.






- For the fifth consecutive year, Malverne High School has been ranked among the top high schools in the nation on The Washington Post's Most Challenging High Schools list.

Answers

Q. DOES THE SCHOOL DISTRICT **SET THE TAX RATE?**

A. No. The final tax rate is not set by the school district and may change as a result of assessment modifications and a tax shift of the adjusted base proportion imposed by the county government.

Q. I HAVE HEARD THE **GOVERNOR HAS PROPOSED A** "TAX FREEZE CREDIT." WHAT **DOES THAT MEAN FOR ME?**

A. This program is slated to continue this year; however, it will carry increased restrictions from the state. As the proposed budget is tax cap-compliant, the district has met its obligation for qualification again this year.

Whether or not qualified homeowners receive a rebate check this year will depend on other outside factors.

Q. WHAT HAPPENS IF **PROPOSITION #2 OR #3 FAILS?**

A. If Proposition #2 or #3 fails, the Board will not be able to move forward with the proposed project. The passing or failing of Propositions #2 and #3 have no bearing on the passing or failing of the proposed 2018-19 budget, and one proposition does not affect the other. If you have any questions, please see the budget presentations posted on the district website, or attend the budget hearing on May 8.

A CONTINGENCY BUDGET

If the proposed budget is defeated in May, the district has the option of putting up the same budget or a revised budget for a revote, or adopting a contingency

If a proposed budget is defeated twice by voters, the district must adopt a contingency budget.

A contingency budget will prohibit spending in specific areas, including community use of buildings, certain salary increases and new equipment purchases. More significantly, under the new law, a district that adopts a contingency budget may not increase its current tax levy by any amount, resulting in a zero percent tax levy increase.

To meet this requirement, the current budget would have to be reduced by \$1,153,876.

Provides for educational software, supplies, equipment, BOCES services and network maintenance. Includes salaries of network manager and computer technicians.

Salaries for guidance counselors, drug and alcohol counselors, at-risk coordinator, registrar and clerical positions. Also includes testing materials, postage, supplies and BOCES services.

HEALTH, PSYCHOLOGICAL AND SOCIAL WORK SERVICES \$1,733,539

\$1,546,961

Salaries of nurses, psychologists and social workers for district schools, including Our Lady of Lourdes and Grace Lutheran; also includes cost of health-related supplies and health services for non-public students attending schools outside the district.

Salaries for club advisors, activity supervision, student publications, and supplies and materials.

INTERSCHOLASTIC ATHLETICS

Includes coaches' stipends and cost of supervision at games, uniforms, officials' and scheduling fees, supplies, equipment replacement and repair.

TRANSPORTATION

Provides for handicapped transportation, K-5 in-district transportation as prescribed by law and Academic Intervention Services required by the New York State Education Department. Also provides for occupational education program at BOCES and services for nonpublic school students.

Retirement, Social Security, Workers' Compensation insurance, and contractual health, life, dental, and disability insurance benefits.

DEBT SERVICE

Principal and interest payments for Energy Performance Plans, bonds, interest payment for Tax Anticipation Notes, providing cash until tax revenues are received.

VOTER INFORMATION

QUALIFICATIONS

Only registered voters can participate in the Malverne Union Free School District budget vote. Anyone who is registered with the Nassau County Board of Elections is already registered.

A voter must be 18 years of age, a United States citizen, and a resident of the Malverne School District for a minimum of 30 days prior to the vote.

REGISTRATION

If you need to register, you may do so on Saturday, May 5 from 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at the Administration Building, located at 301 Wicks Lane in Malverne. You may also register with the Nassau County Board of Elections in Mineola during business hours, Monday through Friday.

ABSENTEE BALLOTS

Registered voters who are interested in casting absentee ballots must request an application from the district clerk by calling (516) 887-6483. When the district clerk's office receives a completed application, an absentee ballot will be sent to the voter.

Anyone who wishes to pick up an application for an absentee ballot may do so prior to May 15 at the Administration Building, located at 301 Wicks Lane (corner of Ocean Avenue), Monday through Friday between the hours of 9 a.m. and 4 p.m. All ballots must be filed with the district clerk by 5 p.m. on the day of the election.

Persons designated "permanently disabled" by the Nassau County Board of Elections will automatically receive an absentee ballot.


