

#### **Fund Balance & Reserves**


The District has continued its commitment to the return of over \$1.0M to the Taxpayers from the budget to reduce taxes and maintain budget expenditures.

Supplemented reserves to assist with Capital, Insurance, Debt Service, Employees Retirement System Contributions, etc.



Maintained reserve levels to continue cash flow and address large, unexpected changes in expense or revenue projections.

#### How is the current 2017-18 budget spent?





#### **2017-18 Budget Reductions**

227 out of the 335 individual budget lines decreased or have stayed the same for the current proposed budget

This is more than 67.7% of the 2017/18 budget lines

# What happens if the proposed budget is not approved by the required margin?

The district may do one of the following:

- 1. Resubmit the defeated budget to the voters on June 20, 2017
- 2. Submit a revised budget to the voters on June 20, 2017
- 3. Adopt a contingent budget



If the revised/second proposed budget is again not approved by the required margin than Malverne will be forced to adopt a contingency budget that levies a tax no greater than that of the prior year (0% increase in tax levy)



Malverne UFSD would be forced to cut \$555,713 from the proposed budget

## Property Tax Relief Credit

- Has also been referred to as a "refund check"
  - This comes directly from New York State
- The District was in compliance for the 2016-17 school year
  - 3<sup>rd</sup> consecutive year the District was in compliance
- For 2017-18 the district intends to again stay within the tax levy limit formula



- Qualified taxpayers must:
  - Live in a school district that is complying with the tax levy limit law
  - Receive the Basic or Enhance STAR property tax relief
  - Have an income of \$275,000 or less

## New York State Comptroller Fiscal Stress Test

#### **Long Island School Districts**

- Two (2) school districts were classified as Significant Stress with a score over 65%
- One (1) school district was classified as Moderate Stress with a score between 45-64%
- Fifteen (15) school districts were classified as Susceptible to fiscal stress with a score between 25-44%



Malverne has been classified in the lowest category — "No Designation"

State-wide over 59 Districts were noted as either Significant, Moderate or Susceptible

## Framework of the Legislative Political Process

November-December: Governor prepares State budget proposal

• January 18, 2017: Governor's budget was released



 <u>February-March</u>: Senate and Assembly recommend budget modifications to the Governors budget

 April 1, 2017: State Budget is approved and released for School District Aid Allocations

#### What can we do?

- January March:
  - Based upon the Governor's released budget initiate a letter writing campaign to influence the Governor.
- February & March:
  - Write to the Senate and Assembly to influence Senators and Assemblymen to increase aid to schools.
