

## **Message From the Superintendent**

This week I had a chance to spend a lot of time at Maurice W. Downing Elementary School as so much was going on to close out the school year. Next year's Kindergarteners, class of 2038, were visiting the school with their parents as we hosted our in-person K orientation. Students were greeted by their K teachers while the parents went through an orientation session in the library. Of course, you know where I was. Many of the faces I recognized from our two PreK centers. The teachers and I were amazed at how proficient the children had become at coloring, writing their names, and building designs with Lego blocks. Many knew their numbers and letters and had no problem working collaboratively with their peers. As their teachers watched them interact with their peers, they remarked on what a difference having the PreK program has meant to our district. We now have a drama performance in each of our schools as MWD hosted their first ever production, Paradesia, with the support of the PTA. Each year our MWD faculty advisor to their student government works with the children to raise funds for Ronald Mc.Donald House. The children generously contribute their pennies and participate in various fund-raising efforts. Well, those pennies add up!! This year they presented a check for \$6,362, bringing the total since 2017 to over \$50,000! This is where it starts, and I just know that these children will continue their generosity and caring for others throughout their lives.

I hope you were able to come out and enjoy our Juneteenth celebration. It seems that the entire community was here enjoying the weather and the many performances. The food truck, student performances, and bouncy house allowed all ages to leave satiated with great food and fun. While we are having fun, let us not forget the meaning of Juneteenth, long celebrated on June 19<sup>th</sup> in Texas since 1865. The celebration commemorates the date when the enslaved people in Texas were finally informed that they were free. This was two years after the Emancipation Proclamation was signed, freeing all enslaved people. The holiday commemorates the date when the enslaved people in Texas joined others across this country in their freedom. It is for this reason that Juneteenth is often referred to as Freedom Day.
