Works

Student attendance in schools remains a concern across the state. Chronic absenteeism in Connecticut more than doubled from 10.4 percent in 2018-19 to 23.7 percent in 2021-22, before rebounding slightly last year to 20%. Chronic absenteeism is defined as missing 10 percent or more of the total number of days enrolled during the school year. As of this writing, we have had 62 days of school. This means that if your student has been absent more than 6 times this year, they are currently considered chronically absent. Being chronically absent impacts

students' ability to read at grade level, perform well academically, and graduate on time.

Last year 12.0% of females and 15.4% of males at LMS were chronically absent from school. So far this year 19% of LMS students are chronically absent. On the flip side, for the month of November, 71 students had perfect attendance.

Please make every effort to ensure your student has an opportunity to feel like they belong as a member of our learning community by ensuring they are in school and on time.

STUDENT DROP OFF AND PICK UP

Students are not allowed in the building until 7:25am. They are considered Tardy after 7:40am.

Drop off - If you are dropping your middle school student off at school in the mornings, please stop at the flagpole, drop them off at the sidewalk and pull around the flagpole circle. The larger circle is for buses only. Please do not drive around the buses.

Pick up - When picking up your child at 2:10pm, please be sure to wait in the first lot. Vehicles should wait in line or in parking spots. Pick up kids are released before the buses.



Ms. Yaun - In the past month, we closed out our Personal Narrative Writing Unit with one last gathering around the campfire. This time, students were the master storytellers. After a long journey of strategy-collecting and student growth, the students shared their final versions of their best personal narratives yet. Their stories were powerful, humorous, and full of their unique voices.

We spent time in November preparing for Veterans' Day, creating artwork of all mediums to show our gratitude to the Veterans who joined us for the school assembly. The students had deep conversations about the intention, thought, and action that should go into respectfully honoring the complexity of veterans' experiences. These reflections were clear in the pieces of art the students made and the questions students asked our veteran guests during our Q&A time. It made for a very moving day.





In December, we have been focusing on the history of the land we now call the United States of America. We are learning about the various cultures, experiences, and perspectives of people who lived (and live!) here. As we interact with these lessons, we actively reflect on how we can do this with as much authentic human connection to the lives we study as possible. Talking about how we do this work is not only about learning this specific content, but is also about building skills for whenever we learn about groups of people. We will carry this mindset with us into our upcoming unit on the War for American Independence!







Ms. Reynolds - This month, we are wrapping up our "Pizza Farm" unit. We have experimented with plants to find out what they need to grow, gain matter, and live. We focused on what energy and matter move through the farm (and every ecosystem) for our pizza ingredients to grow. This phenomena will culminate in a project where students will calculate how much space and resources their farm will require. We will build our farms keeping in mind how they will impact the natural environment. We will discuss human impact on the natural world and explore ways we can refine out farms to lessen the impact on our planet.

Mr. McLean - Our fifth grade readers have continued to hone their intensive reading skills and have focused on using context clues to make inferences and draw conclusions, both in their writing and in large and small group discussions. In addition, going back into the text to find specific evidence to support responses has been a point of emphasis throughout the curriculum. While we've used the Trophies anthology and historical fiction/nonfiction stories and plays in Storyworks throughout term one, we are now beginning our first novel, The Sign of the Beaver, which coincides nicely with the students' colonization focus in social studies.

Mr. Reynolds - In 5th grade math we have just finished our introduction to decimals. This included comparing the magnitude of decimals, rounding decimals, and being able to read decimal numbers in word form. Upon gaining an understanding of decimals we move toward accurately and efficiently adding and subtracting decimal numbers. We are now transitioning to similar skills with fractions. The goal is to build a strong connection between decimal numbers and fractions. A major objective for the month is to become proficient in adding and subtracting fractions and mixed numbers with different denominators.

Mrs. Archer - 6th Grade Reading:

Students are currently working on their non-fiction unit in our Reader's Workshop program.

After noting their personal interests, sixth graders met with their book club groups and chose their texts. Our main focus has been on determining central ideas in their books by tracing the roots of the author's details and learning from stories embedded with the texts. Next well move onto summarizing complex sections and formulating opinions based on the author's point of view.

6th grade SS: Quarter 2 has begun and students have moved onto their new civilization and new SS teacher. Those who left China are now discovering new things about ancient Egypt. Students who just finished Egypt are investigating ancient Greece and those who moved from Greece are now learning about ancient Rome. Coming full circle, after Rome students traveled to the world of the ancient Chinese. In conjunction with their new civilization that students are exploring, they will also complete a geography unit on mapping skills, latitude and longitude and the five themes of geography.

Mrs. Huntington - Our 6th grade scientists have been working hard to figure out what features of cup systems work to keep water hot or cold. So far, we have planned and completed several experiments on different features of the cup system to see how they affect the water inside. We are currently working to set up an experiment to see how light affects cups of different colors and materials.

Unit 2: Decimals & Fractions introduces students to dividing fractions; using the standard algorithm to add, subtract, multiply and divide decimals, and using the standard algorithms to divide whole numbers.

Unit 3: Ratio Concepts & Equivalent Ratios introduces students to representing ratios using ratio language and finding equivalent ratios.

Unit 4: Unit Rates & Percent introduces students to rates and percents. A rate is a ratio that tells how many units of one quantity there are for every 1 unit of a second auantity.

Mrs. Violette: Students in 6th grade language arts are working on writing persuasive essays. In the first section of this unit, we reviewed how to use webs and outlines to organize and plan our essays before writing. We also discussed the basic structure of a five paragraph essay. In the second part of the unit we are drafting our essays. We will then learn how to revise them to make them more persuasive through writing techniques such as hooking the reader, including illustrative stories, considering order of importance, and ending with a call to action. In the third section of this unit, students will be given non-fiction articles to read on an assigned topic and then will be asked to write a persuasive essay on their topic which includes research and quotes from the articles.

Parents are reminded that writing homework is graded each day on whether or not a student has completed it on time. Writing homework is not graded on accuracy or content. These homework grades appear in the gradebook as "preparation for class" grades. Therefore assignments labeled as preparation cannot be made up for credit later in the quarter. Root word slides, which are due every Friday, are graded for accuracy. These grades can be made up later in the quarter for up to a maximum grade of 70%. Mr. Comeau - In December, students are doing a deep dive into Feudalism (the prominent social and governmental system of the Medieval era). Students will discover what the responsibilities of a King, Noble, Knight, and Peasant are. They will also learn what life was like during the 5th-15th century, and how scary wars and conflict can be.

Mrs. Korzoff - In December 7th graders are finishing up the Operations with Rational Numbers Unit. After learning about repeating and terminating decimals they will learn how to convert between fractions and decimals. We will end 2023 with practicing mixed operations with Rational numbers.

Accelerated Class will be working on Solving Algebraic Equations and Inequalities. We will learn how to model word problems with multi step equations and inequalities and how to interpret and/or graph the solution.

Mr. Schultheis - This month in science we are finishing our MRE flameless heater unit. Students have tested their prototypes and have made changes to their design based on their results. They then tested them again to see if their changes helped their design get closer or meet the criteria. They are currently working on transferring their information they learned from this unit and apply it to an issue happening with sea turtles. Our next unit we will start this month will explore a case study on a medical issue and look into how her medical issue affected the body system. We will investigate how body systems work together to keep us healthy.

Mr. Andrews - In Language Arts we have recently wrapped up our first Novel Unit:) Dystopian Book Clubs. Many students have read two, three, or more books from their series. Great work! Keep on reading. We will start our next unit working together with our School Counselor Mrs. Clark which will take us on an exploration of career pathways. Ask your students about this research and what careers interest them.

Mrs. Gaucher - We will be focusing on the Declaration of Independence in the month of December. Students will review the Cornell Note-Taking process in preparation for note-taking this year and in high school. We'll go on to close-read the Declaration of Independence and convert the grievances into modern language. I will give students some background on Lin Manuel Miranda and we will analyze the song, "You'll Be Back!" From here we will transition into learning about different types of governments and their characteristics in preparation for our unit on the Constitution. Mrs. Keough - In 8th grade Spanish, students are finishing up Chapter 2 of the text. We will also look at how Christmas and New Years are celebrated around the Spanish speaking world. Midterms are coming halfway through January so beginning to study is a great idea for winter break!

Ms. Bowen - Students are finishing up the Social Issues Book Club unit and moving on to the Position Paper Unit. Students will be researching and debating different issues through essays. As a reminder, all students

should be actively looking for a host for the job shadow project! The shadow itself needs to take place by the end of April Break! Mr. Halbrooks - Pre-Algebra will be spending the month of December looking at different aspects of linear equations. We will cover solving equations with one variable, working with equations with two variables, and finally to systems of equations where we will have more than one equation to deal with. This unit covers a lot of material and will be the core of Algebra 1 next year.

Algebra 1 will move away from looking at functions in general and focus on linear functions. We will see linear relationships as equations, tables, and graphs. The unit in December will deal with the basics of these multiple representations while using slope-intercept form (y=mx+b). In January we will expand this to linear equations using different forms.

Mr. Ortiz - This month in science, the eighth grade students will explore how energy is stored and transferred in a system, as well as investigate how other forces like friction and air resistance affect the kinetic energy of an object before a collision. Then students will apply their understanding of materials and collision forces to a design that either answers a question or solves a

HEALTH ROOM UPDATES

Absences: If your child is going to be absent, please be sure to call the attendance line at (860)642-5626 or the school nurse at (860)642-5630 and provide your child's name and reason for absence. This will assist with tracking illnesses within the school.

Illness Guidelines: Students should not return to school until:

- Common Cold: Temperature is normal for 24 hours and excessive symptoms of cough/sneezing have subsided.
- Fever: Normal temperature for 24 hours without fever-reducing medication.
- Strep Throat: Free of fever and symptoms for one day and at least 24 hours after the first dose of antibiotic.
- Vomiting: No vomiting for 24 hours
- Diarrhea: No diarrhea for 24 hours.
- Conjunctivitis (Pink Eye): When discharge and inflammation have cleared, or with ten doctor's approval. Bacterial conjunctivitis requires at least one dose of antibiotic. The student may return the next day.

Computers with Mr. Klosowski

In 8th Grade Computers, we have mostly focused on the effects of technology on our jobs and lives, Internet Safety and the reliability of what we read on the Internet, and coding with code.org. Over the remaining 5 weeks, we'll begin to work on our Invention project in Canva. The project involves students creating an idea for an invention, and then using all of the marketing tools in Canva.com to create the real-world items to 'sell' their invention. Students will create logos, business cards, web pages and other presentations for their invention.

In 7th Grade, we have also worked on Internet Safety and website reliability. Our main project in grade 7 involves creating a Country Web Page Project. The project tasks students with first researching a country and then creating a web page explaining all they've learned. It is my hope that students will learn more about another country, but also see the important differences and similarities between the USA and other nations of the world.


In 6th Grade, we have worked on Internet Safety and coding, but we have also been working on typing.com to improve our key-boarding skills. If your child still types with 2 fingers, I highly recommend having them work on their typing skills at home. It is a free program that does a great job in teaching keyboarding skills. Over the remaining weeks of Quarter 2, we'll begin to work on Google Sheets. This Google application allows you to create spreadsheets, do math, sort data, and many other processes. We'll culminate our Sheets work with a spreadsheet on which students will spend a fictional million dollars.

As in the other grades, 5th Graders are learning about Internet Safety, coding, and typing. In this class we are currently beginning our work on our project in grade 5 called My Place in the World. This Google Slides project requires students to research the places where they live (Lebanon, Connecticut, The United States, and the planet Earth. They will generate a slide for each topic including maps, images, and fun facts about each place. My hope is that they will learn about their town, state and maybe better appreciate their place in the world.

6th grade students begin each class with typing exercises in typing.com to become more proficient typists, which will help them in many classes. Then, the class shifts to focus on work for the public service announcement that students are creating. So far, sixth graders have viewed sample PSAs and brainstormed important topics. Now they're starting to search for information in ScholasticGO! (https://digital.scholastic.com/site/launch/schgo-?ucn=600126262) and on reliable websites to learn more about their topics.

8th grade students started the quarter by selecting a research topic. They used inquiry-based activities to help guide them towards choosing a topic that is interesting to them. Most recently, eighth graders learned about search techniques (Boolean logic) and searched for information in the state library's databases (https://researchitct.org/classicmiddleschool/) and ScholasticGO (https://digital.scholastic.com/site/launch/schgo-?ucn=600126262). They also learned about evaluating websites and will soon dive into taking notes from each of their sources.

Intervention Reading with Ms. Picard

Intervention Reading Students "Wrapped Up" in Books

Students in Intervention Reading Classes are wrapping up their class novels.

Sixth graders have finished The Stumptown Kid, wrapping up with a unit on using questioning strategies to increase comprehension. They are now moving to a series a novels connected to their Social Studies topics.

Seventh graders are deep into their dystopian novels. They are working to understand text patterns and are using that reading to develop a greater understanding of the settings and conflicts for their various group novels. Eighth graders are finishing their work with Social Issues novels and have combined various non-fiction reading activities to deepen their understanding of the conflicts and hope their characters face. All students will complete an independent reading choice through the second half of the marking period, using this assignment as an opportunity to apply strategies to a genre and topic of their own choosing.



Ho - Ho - Holiday Reading













December tales talk about sugar plums dancing in the air, sleigh rides, and jolly elves. However, there is more to a holiday story than treats and funny characters. Stories and novels set during this period can show humor, growth, sadness, and irony. If you are looking for a good book to share with your child over the December break, try one of these classic stories:

The House without a Christmas Tree by Gail Rock - Set in a small town, this novella tells the story of a family torn apart by loss, but brought together by a child's desire to have a small Christmas tree to recognize the holiday.

One Yellow Daffodil by David A. Adler - This short novella talks about the Holocaust and the meaning behind Jewish holidays like Hannukah.

The Best (worst) Christmas Pageant Ever by Barbara Robinson - A funny, yet poignant story, this book is part of a short series of books about an enthusiastic yet out-of-control, family of kids who show their neighbors the real spirit of Christmas.

Roll of Thunder, Hear My Cry by Mildred Taylor - Based on family stories told to the author during her childhood, this novel talks about the love and struggles shared by an African American family living in the Deep South. One particularly poignant chapter is set during the Christmas season.

A Very Special Kwanza by Debbi Chocolate - This novel for early middle school students helps readers understand the importance of family holiday traditions.



When is sick too sick for school?





School is better with you, even if you're a little under the weather!



Send me to school if:

- I have a runny nose or just a little cough, but no other symptoms.
- I haven't taken any fever reducing medicine for
 24 hours, and I haven't had a fever during that time.
- I haven't thrown up or had any diarrhea for 24 hours.

Keep me at home if:

- I have a temperature higher than 100 degrees even after taking medicine; keep me home until I am fever-free for 24 hours without medicine.
- I'm throwing up or have diarrhea.
- My eyes are pink and crusty.







Call the doctor if:

- I have a temperature higher than
 100 degrees for more than two days.
- I've been throwing up or have diarrhea for more than two days.
- I've had the sniffles for more than a week, and I'm not getting better.
- I still have asthma symptoms after using my asthma medicine (and call 911 if I'm having trouble breathing after using an inhaler).



If you think your child may have COVID-19, please test them prior to sending them to school.

Is your child missing school due to anxiety?





Definition of anxiety: feeling of fear and uneasiness about everyday situations.

If your child is suffering from anxiety, you are not alone. The good news is that in most situations, anxiety is normal and temporary. Anxiety becomes a concern if it persists — it can affect relationships with family, peers and teachers, contribute to academic challenges, and lead to school avoidance/refusal. Addressing anxiety is important for a child's overall well-being, not just attendance.

In addition, if your child starts to complain of symptoms like a headache or stomachache, it is important to *quickly determine* whether this is related to anxiety or a physical illness that might require missing school. If the challenge is anxiety, staying home may worsen the situation.

What are the symptoms of anxiety?



Persistent anxiety can present in many ways, making it difficult to recognize.

Symptoms may vary depending on the age of the child, and some children may keep worries to themselves or have difficulty explaining their feelings making it hard to identify symptoms. Anxiety symptoms can include, but aren't limited to, the following:

- Feeling tired, irritable or easily tearful
- Having trouble separating from parents
- Experiencing difficulty sleeping or frequent nightmares
- Having trouble getting out of bed or dressed for school
- Lacking appetite
- Having trouble concentrating, which may lead to difficulty starting tasks, problems with homework and falling behind in school
- Experiencing physical symptoms, including stomachaches and headaches
- Avoiding activities they previously enjoyed
- Having negative or continuous thoughts that something bad is going to happen

What can families do?

Here are some tips that you can use to help your child get through these challenges, by intervening as quickly as possible, and return to school:

- Do not punish your child for refusing to go to school, as this can worsen things.
- If possible, avoid letting your child stay home. Though staying home from school may
 provide short-term relief for your child, continued absence from school will lead to the
 feeling of being disconnected from classmates and teachers, cause your child to fall
 behind academically and only make it harder to return.
- Speak with your child. Try to understand what's bothering them and why they are avoiding school. If you are feeling a similar anxiety, it may help to share this with your child and to explain what you are doing to get through it.
- Make it clear that you are there to help your child and that you believe they can face their fears and get through this problem.

Take advantage of school resources.

Working through your child's anxiety issues can be difficult and scary, and you shouldn't have to do it alone. Take advantage of the resources at your child's school:

- Talk with the school nurse, counselor, social worker and/or psychologist to discuss the student's challenges, identify what can help your child and develop a return-to-school plan.
- For some students, this may need to happen gradually (one or two classes initially and eventually a full day).
- In certain situations, a 504 plan or Individualized Education Program may be needed to ensure your child receives appropriate support and resources.

If symptoms persist or are very severe, your child's anxiety may be due to an underlying behavioral health disorder (i.e., anxiety disorder, panic disorder), an undiagnosed learning disability or the result of a physical or chronic health condition and should be evaluated by your child's medical provider.

Finally, remember to take care of your own physical and emotional well-being!
