2. QUESTIONS FOR MEETING WITH DR. HOOKER

Clarke Central Parent:	My child has been late to school every day they ride the bus. The bus does not come in time to get them to school on time. By the time they get to school, there is no breakfast and class has started.
REPLY REQUESTED	This is an issue that needs more information to address. As the parent did not leave contact information or bus route details, we can't address it.
Dr. Beth Wurzburg, Burks Parent:	We know that children greatly benefit from time outdoors. What is the district doing to ensure that students of all ages are getting time to go outside and move their bodies at least daily during school hours (especially for our younger students) and maybe even multiple times per day? Other than recess at elementary schools, are teachers incentivized in any way to get kids outside?
✓ REPLY REQUESTED	30 minutes of recess at each school and 45-50 minutes of PE. Dr. Hooker said that he would talk with Mr. Snow (principal at Burks) about what options exist.
TRES Parent:	Are the restrictions/controls for website content controlled at the school level or the district level?
REPLY REQUESTED	District level for the most part, but schools are able to customize controls for specific goals. There's a guidance document provided to schools to uphold the standards.

BHL Parent:	I-Ready- Why are we grading whether our on grade level student is completing 45 minutes of I-Ready as part of social studies class? If we are grading based on the STANDARDS, I-Ready is not part of the social studies standards. Kids are getting a grade in ELA and Social Studies for COMPLIANCE (do they have their minutes?), not the standards. If I-Ready is working, why are kids still not on grade level despite doing it since Pre-K? 7, 8, 9 years later, they are still doing it and they HATE it. When have adults ever done something tedious every week for 8 years and found it worthwhile? Kids do not have adult brains yet we wonder why they are not completing their I-Ready minutes. The district I-Ready representative herself stated that I-Ready does not recommend giving students a grade for it, yet, here we are, giving them grades in multiple classes. Please make it make sense. If a child has an A in SOCIAL STUDIES but is receiving a B due to noncompliance with I-Ready minutes in ELA and Math, tell me how that is standards based grading? I-Ready should be used as an intervention, not as a punitive grade for on grade level students.
REPLY REQUESTED	This is a discussion that needs to happen with school administrative teams, but sparked a great deal of discussion at our meeting. There's a question about i-Ready's effectiveness – by state law we have to have some sort of diagnostic assessment. Within i-Ready, it creates a personalized platform that gives the students targeted practice in a skill that they are deficient in or in skills that would extend their learning – this intervention is used for students in middle school during extended-learning-time. But if it's being used outside of these standards, there's a need to meet with the building leader.
Jami Mays, Oglethorpe Ave Parent:	Can you speak to any district-wide program changes that have resulted from Mr. Trump's litany of executive orders? Specifically the orders to remove race-based programs, discussions about racism and gender, new "patriotic education" requirements.
REPLY REQUESTED	Executive orders have to be enacted by congress, so please reach out to your elected representatives and share your thoughts. At risk: Early head start – Title 1 Funds – we have no ways to anticipate what sort of budget cuts might occur.
Sue Harmon, Oglethorpe Ave Parent:	I ate at my grandchild's school and was disappointed to see mountains of styrofoam trays. Is there any chance the school system could look at partnering with ACC gov commercial compost program and use reusable trays to serve our students?
REPLY REQUESTED	Sustainability recommendation is to partner with ACC Gov to partner with recycling and composting.
Sue Harmon, Oglethorpe Ave Parent:	I'm not sure if this is a system wide concern but I find it troubling that candy is promoted for classroom rewards, fundraising at events (concessions), as well as other things (candy grams). Don't we need to discourage this candy consumption in our schools if we are serious about promoting healthy food choices?
REPLY REQUESTED	This should be a question directed to school administrators.
Halo Smart, Clarke Middle	What is the plan to search for a new superintendent? What is the timeline and process?

Parent:	
REPLY REQUESTED	We can skip this question as it was addressed in the announcement about Dr. Scott's interim post.
Kate Morrissey Stahl, Winterville Elementary Parent:	I would like to make sure that gender expansive students feel supported in our public schools. That also means that teachers would need adequate training. Second, I would love for there to be programs for english speakers to practice Spanish. In addition to the many programs that help spanish speakers to learn english.
REPLY REQUESTED	Casa de Amistad has classes for English learning for adults. Dr. Hooker asked if there were any reported issues regarding gender expansive students not feeling supported and said that CCSD would support all students.
OAES Parent:	What is the process for selecting a new superintendent? In what ways can the district involve PAB in the decision-making process?
REPLY REQUESTED	Reach out to the board about that process.
Community Member:	At the February PAB meeting, concerns were brought up about inconsistencies regarding LSGTeams across the district. At that meeting, Ms. Palmer requested contact information for each team's secretaries and said she would follow up with them regarding minutes and agendas. What is the status of that endeavor? I'm still seeing lots of schools with pages that haven't been updated during this school year. How else should the community go about seeking accountability to LSGTeams?
REPLY REQUESTED	Work in process. All district stakeholders need to be brought to the table and that expectations can be held to a solid standard.
At meeting question:	What should parents do about tutoring or summer school this year?
REPLY REQUESTED	It's a budgetary problem – with the decrease in Title 1 funding, the district prioritized keeping the funding in schools so as to not disrupt job postings. Summer school is funded with surplus funds and we have a 15% shortfall of funding due to federal cuts. Fowler, JJ Harris and Gaines are 21st Century Sites (grant-funded)
At meeting question:	Where does BEACON testing come in?
REPLY REQUESTED	Beacon testing is an interim assessment and is more like Milestones and the district can input what the curriculum has actually covered and test mastery. The Beacon system allows teachers to give "testlets" in individual subjects.
At meeting question:	To what extent is i-Ready "hackable" – could a kid construct an automated action or use AI to do it? There was some sort of funny business that occurred at Hilsman. Sometimes, kids know that if they keep answering correctly, i-Ready will keep challenging them so they will sometimes answer incorrectly on purpose to get to the

	"brain breaks" and games, etc.
REPLY REQUESTED	There are some tight firewalls and security measures that prevent this sort of thing. We also have GoGuardian and see exactly what children have on their screens as it's happening.
