The meeting was called to order by Vice-Chairperson Charlie Stein, also in attendance were Nikki Ohnstad, Jennifer Rusten. Anna Halvorson entered at the end of the meeting. Dave Blasey was absent. Also present were Superintendent Jay Slade, Principals Jackie Bye and Clay Johnson, Hunter Sand Activity Director and Lori Dahl Business Manager.

Policy BCAA was added to the list of policies for 2nd reading, was originally left off the agenda. All agreed to the addition.

The minutes, bills and financial reports were given to the board for review and approval.

Motion by Jennifer Rusten second by Nikki Ohnstad to approve the minutes as printed, the bills for payment and the financial reports as presented. All in favor, motion carried.

Elementary Principals Report: Dr. Bye Back to School Night at the elementary where there will be a parent meeting to inform the parents/stakeholders about our schoolwide title goals. Also presented the student achievement goals for the year in math and reading language arts. Work on the outdoor basketball systems, and the \$10,000 in donations received. City of McVille assisted with the removal of the old poles. Dr. Bye reported on staffing, summer maintenance, the installation of bathroom stalls. The air conditioning is still in progress, on line clothing store with Decorated wearables they are building us a online store. Also listed the staffing and the class sizes. We had vandalism of the little silver car shooting the side windows and the windshield and slashed or shot the front tires out. It has been reported to law enforcement, towed and reported to insurance.

High School Principal's Report: Mr. Johnson reported the high school had no serious projects this summer, routine cleaning and painting, the school looks great! We have filled the business position with Mr. Larson and Mara Berdal, she will be eligible for a teaching permit for the position, and will eventually take classes for permanent certification. Karen Retzlaff will be our full time sub/para, back to school night is Monday 4-6:30 with a junior high parent meeting in the gym, We will continue the reading intervention program and are implementing a math program.

Activity Director Report: Hunter Sand updated the board on Girls Golf, Football started last week Varsity Volleyball will start on Monday. Coaches now have an iPad to use for stats and games and tripods for recording. Football will need a few supplies and more field paint. Mr. Sand updated the board on the meetings he has attended and what is scheduled for later this fall.

A Tuition Waiver application received for 2 students to attend Northwood. Mr. Slade recommends approval of the application.

Motion by Jennifer Rusten, second by Nikki Ohnstad to approve the tuition waiver to Northwood. All in favor, motion carried.

Scholarship Updates:

Last year, 6 seniors qualified for the ND Scholarship. Students attending a technical college received \$3000 and university students receive \$6000. Students must be attending a ND college or plan to transfer back in state at some point to finish their degree.

It's best for students to start taking their GPA seriously by 10th grade in order to reach the 3.0 threshold. Students also need to strategize and possibly take some CTE and/or online classes depending on the track they want to focus on. In the past the scholarship was all based on GPA and the ACT/Work Keys. As of class of 2025, the options have changed greatly, hopefully allowing more students to qualify.



This is a really good scholarship to get. No essays and the application takes 2 minutes. Money also just drops into your student account!

College Counseling Updates:

11th graders will attend a Career Exploration and College Fair on September 9th at LRSC. Students will select 3 careers that interest them and then attend breakout sessions with real life professionals from those fields. It's hands-on and quick-paced; just enough tidbits to get students curiosity peaked. We will then attend a College Fair where 40 different trade schools and universities will be. This is an excellent way to realize there is a lot more out there besides UND, BSC or LRSC. Today North Dakotans are offered Lynnes Welding school, several different hair salon academies and even a reiki and massage school.

September: Suicide Awareness Month

Have you ever heard about the connection between the semi-colon and suicide? The semi-colon became a well known symbol for suicide prevention back in 2013 and still continues to be. "Project Semi-Colon" is what the movement became known as. The semi-colon represents a choice to continue living rather than ending life. When people write, they have a choice to end a sentence or bridge two sentences with a semi-colon. Hence the purpose of the semi-colon is to recognize the hardships people have to bridge the gap of wanting to end their life and living. People often will draw or tattoo a semi-colon. The use of the semi-colon represents a personal strength of overcoming suicide but can also be a way for someone to show support for others. To error on the side of caution, if you ever see your child doodle semi-colons, it's worth asking them about it or referring them to the counselors, Mr. Martin or Ms. Beckstrom

Medication Disbursement Policy

Due to North Dakota State Medication Disbursement Recommendations — as of August 2015, Dakota Prairie staff may administer, but not provide any type of non-prescription medication to any student. This includes, but is not limited to, aspirin, ibuprofen, Tylenol, Benadryl, cough drops, and antacids.

For non-prescription and prescription medicine that is a medical necessity throughout the day, prior arrangements must be made before the school can administer any medication. Proper forms need to be filled out and returned to the school along with the medication.
