The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Dave Blasey with members Charlie Stein, Anna Halvorson Nikki Ohnstad and Jennifer Rusten present. Also present were Superintendent Jay Slade, Principals Jackie Bye, Clay Johnson, Athletic Director Hunter Sand and Lori Dahl Business Manager.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited

Motion by Charlie Stein second by Anna Halvorson to approve the agenda with the addition of a tuition waiver under items for decision. All in favor, motion carried.

Motion by Jennifer Rusten second by Charlie Stein to approve the September 2025 minutes as printed. All in favor, motion carried.

Motion by Charlie Stein second by Nikki Ohnstad to approve the bill list as presented for payment. All in favor, motion carried.

Athletic Director Report: Girls golf ended the season with one state qualifier, she did well at state, the junior high football team ended the season undefeated, the High School football team has one game left this Friday and has ben plagued with injuries. Senior night was last Friday. The boys' basketball schedule is completed, there will be 5 teams, the girls schedule is still a work in progress, the numbers are down.

Elementary Principal's Report: Events and Activities, NDSA and NDA+ Testing results from Spring, Building and Grounds, Pre-K Tuition payments and concerns for attendance. Also discussed parent teacher conferences, town hall meetings and the care center, and the current enrollment. Dr. Bye and Mr. Johnson are working out ways to handle the ELL needs of the district.

High School Principal Report: Mr. Johnson reported on the testing results, the interventions and changes made based on the results, looking for a good turnout for parent teacher conferences, more emphasis is being placed on testing results to the students. The one act play is in progress. E-sports and Academic Olympics will be competing soon. We have 2 seniors who may be requesting early graduation in the next month or 2, both have many things to complete before this will be a reality.

Mr. Slade reported on transportation concerns, the north route will be without a driver after the Christmas break unless we can get someone qualified to take over, there is a substitute on the route at this time, who does not want full time driving. Next year we will be very short of drivers as we have some who are near retirement, we have advertised that we will pay for training, but have had very little interest.

The financial reports were presented for the board's review. Motion by Charlie Stein, second by Nikki Ohnstad to approve the financial reports as presented. All in favor, motion carried.

Anna Halvorson had a patron with question regarding the current configuration of the schools and wondering if there was any way to make changes to it, or what would be required, questions about any educational sharing with neighboring districts. The history was discussed and questions are always welcome.

Nikki Ohnstad, Anna Halvorson, and Jennifer Rusten attended the NDSA annual conference and gave the board some information they picked up.

There was no public comment.

The next meeting is set for November 12, 2025 at 7:00 p.m. at the Dakota Prairie High School.

#### **Parent-Teacher Conferences**

### Reading Intervention - DreamBox

We've officially launched our *DreamBox Reading* program, a personalized reading intervention that adjusts to each student's skill level as they progress. This program has helped students improve multiple grade levels in reading fluency and comprehension. To maximize its impact, I encourage families to have their students spend a little time on DreamBox at home. If you'd like to help your child get started or have any questions, please don't hesitate to reach out.

### Math Support – IXL

In addition to DreamBox, we're excited to begin implementing *IXL* for math intervention. IXL is a proven program that works hand-in-hand with classroom instruction to strengthen basic math facts, computation, and problem-solving skills. Together, these tools will help ensure our students build a solid foundation in both literacy and numeracy.

As fall turns toward winter, we are reminded how quickly the school year moves — and how important it is to keep working together to support our students' growth. Thank you for all you do to make Dakota Prairie a great place to learn and thrive.


# **Counseling News:**


A big shout-out to our seniors! Several jumped at the chance to apply for early acceptance to college. Others are diligently preparing for military service. Way to start the year strong!

### **Dear Senior Parents/Guardians,**

The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) opens October 1<sup>st</sup> this year. Completing the FAFSA gives students access to federal grants, loans, and scholarships.

Before you begin, both **you (the parent)** and **your student** will need to create an **FSA ID**. This ID acts as your electronic signature for the FAFSA. Over the next week, the FSA ID will verify your identity with Social Security and also link your 2024 tax return from the IRS.

Once you get an email stating the FSA ID is complete, then you complete the FAFSA which should only take 20 minutes. All your info will pull from the IRS and SS automatically. Make sure you complete the **FAFSA 2026-2027.**

- © Complete the FAFSA (when it opens): https://studentaid.gov/h/apply-for-aid/fafsa

### Quick tips:

- The FAFSA is free to complete—never pay for it.
- Use your correct social security number.
- Use an email you'll always check (not your school one).
- Each student and one parent must have their own separate FSA ID.
- Even if you think you may not qualify for aid, many scholarships and colleges still require the FAFSA to win a university scholarship.

FAFSA does NOT renew. You will re-apply every October while your teen is in college

### Questions that arise:

- 1. Divorced parents: you're supposed to use the tax return for the parent who contributes 50% or more of their income to your expenses. Otherwise use the tax return of the parent who makes less (to up your chances of qualifying for a pell grant)
- 2. Guardians: If your only income is social security that is fine. It should pull this info into the FAFSA for you.
- 3. Remarried parents: If your parent remarries, you may have to use both the parent and step-parent's tax return (if the file jointly).
- 4. Why do I have to use my parent's income? While rare, some students can qualify as an "independent filer" which means they aren't required to use their parents/guardians tax info. The only time this works is if a student is homeless or couch surfing, has run away, was in foster care after a certain age, has grandparents that are guardians, and a few other examples. Otherwise the law says students must use their parent's tax return until the age of 24.

### From the Desk of Dr. Jackie Bye, Elementary Principal

Happy November! A great time to reflect on the year so far and think about thankfulness. At Dakota Prairie Elementary there are so many things to be thankful for. Above all, the students. I am thankful for the beginning of each day when I get to see the enthusiastic students come to school ready to engage with their classmates, friends, and teachers.



I am thankful for all of the activities they get to experience that help them grow and learn. In the last month the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grades had a field trip to the Nelson Pumpkin Patch by Emerado, and the 3<sup>rd</sup> grade had a field trip to Grand Forks for an afternoon of Full STEAM Ahead sponsored by the Grand Forks Children's Museum. The teachers and students who attended these activities all had a great time and got to try fun and new things. On Halloween the elementary grades PK-6 took turns going with Ms. Bina to the Care Center in McVille to sing and do activities with the residents throughout the school day. And the high school band and choir did a Halloween performance for us as well, with the 6<sup>th</sup> grade band joining in for a band song.

I am thankful for the hard work and dedication of our teaching and resource room staff at Dakota Prairie Elementary. They put in hours of time finding the best way to help each student learn. One example of how the collaboration of the whole staff working together is how our students perform on the North Dakota State Assessment each spring. In the spring of 2025 the state assessment changed, and is now called ND A+ Summative. Since it was a new assessment we just received the results in the end of September. For the state assessment at the elementary level the state only tests grades 3-6. These are the results for the elementary and compared to the state overall average. This shows the percent of students who are proficient in the ND standards in each subject area for the elementary grades 3-6.

### NDSA – ND A+ Summative Spring 2024-2025

**MATH:** DPE: Grades 3-6: **65% State** ND: **45%** 

ELA (READING): DPE Grades 3-6: 52% State ND: 39%

Each state sets its own Proficiency Goal and Cut Score. North Dakota has always set the proficiency score high in comparison to some other states. The way it has been explained to us was using a sports comparison. Think about kicking a field goal in football. A 30-yard field goal is tough but doable and that would be what most states proficiency cut scores would be comparable to. ND cut score for proficiency is more like a 45-yard field goal against the wind. We are requiring greater skill and precision, and have higher expectations on students to prove what they know and understand.

I am thankful we can provide activities for our students to participate in. The 5th and 6<sup>th</sup> grade boys' basketball season started their season on October 7, with four 5<sup>th</sup> grade boys and seven 6<sup>th</sup> grade boys participating. Their coach is Jason Beglau. You can find their schedule in the Knight Reader and on our school website. They are a fun group to watch play. They hustle, pass and shoot well, and play with good sportsmanship.

The first concert of the year will be held on **Friday**, **November 7**, at 1:00 in the big gym at the el-

ementary school. **Grades Preschool-6**<sup>th</sup> **grade** will be performing in honor of our Veterans in a Veteran's Day Concert. Please join us for what will surely be a great afternoon of singing, as Ms. Bina always has the students ready to show their musical talents.

I am thankful for the whole ancillary staff at Dakota Prairie Elementary that work diligently every day to make sure students get to school and home again safely (*Jeff, Linda, Lee, Glenn, Jim, Carol, Todd, Betty, Jason, Larry*), the students have a clean building (*Chris, LeeAnn, Mike, Carol*), food to eat (*Corinna, Vivian*), and a million other things they need from band aids to organizing bus notes to answering your calls (*Debbie*). In November let one of the people, from teachers to ancillary staff, who spend the day helping to Grow your Child what you are thankful to them about.


