Leading for Their Tomorrow

Hello, my name is Lisa Beames and I am the Interim Superintendent for the Grinnell-Newburg Community Schools for the 24-25. I am very excited to be here and look forward to our upcoming school year.

As a 1st year teacher long ago, I had a student named Katie. She was bright, straightforward and often just said whatever was on her mind. From time to time, she also liked to be the center of attention. One day while I was working with several other students, Katie blurted out, "Why do we have to learn this. I just want to grow-up, get married and stay here to raise my children. I don't need this."

My response to Katie...and her classmates...was this. "If that is what you choose to do, are happy and a productive member of your community, then that is wonderful. The challenge we have is that my job is not to prepare you for what you think you want today. My job is to work to prepare you for the choices you may want should you ever change your mind.

I often think about Katie and the impact she afforded me in clarifying the "why" to my journey of becoming a teacher. Teaching was not actually my 1st career choice when I graduated from high school. Please don't get me wrong...it has been an amazing life and I feel proud and blessed for being an educator. When I walked across the stage at my high school graduation, I was going to become an architect. I loved drafting and design. Yet, nobody told me that I should have gotten into the art classroom. Without absolutely any background in sketching/drawing, the gap of experience and skill was too great. The goal of becoming an architect was unreachable and thus through the guidance of an English professor, I found my way into education.

I believe in many ways, I have been so much more fortunate to have found my way into education and ultimately to have been

able to help build school systems that better prepare students for the choices they don't often yet know lie before them.

Building and redesigning school systems is not unlike building homes or commercial facilities in that one we have to think holistically and in detail and we have to lead in thought and action to ensure that it all works together efficiently for the purposes proposed.

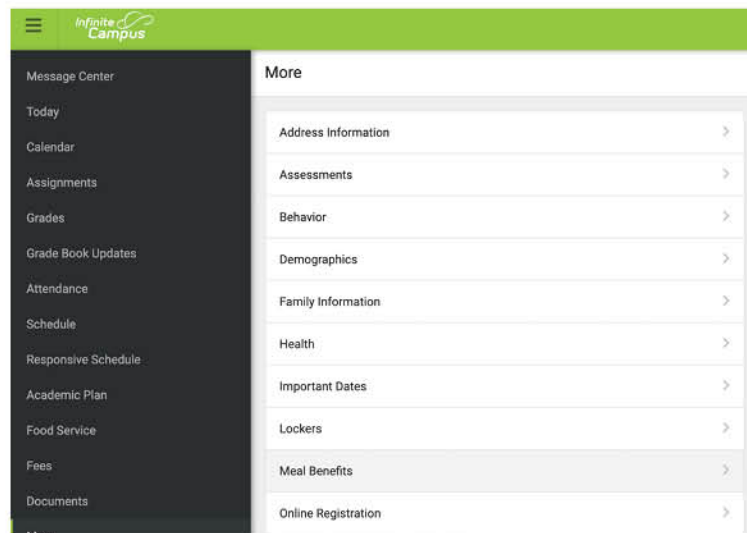

BREAKFAST & LUNCH

Free or reduced price breakfast and lunch meals are available to students of families meeting the income or other qualifications listed on the application forms. The information on these forms is kept strictly confidential. Because of the way the school lunch computer is set up, other students will not be aware that your child qualifies for free or reduced price meals.

Free and reduced price meal applications are available through the parent portal by clicking on the "More" and "Meal Benefits" tab on the left hand menu bar, and then clicking on the link for the Meal Benefits Application. Computers will be available to fill out your online application at the building locations, as well as during the Registration Night on August 5, 2024. Paper applications can also be obtained in the office at each school building.



Middle school and high school students also have the option of purchasing a la carte food items at an additional charge to their account. The a la carte items are food items that are normally separate from the school breakfast and lunch menu. If you do not want your student to purchase these extra-charge a la carte items, please discuss this with your student and contact Kim Sieck at kim.sieck@grinnell-k12.org to limit this option. Families of students on the free or reduced price meal plans will be charged and must pay for a la carte food items purchased.

The State of Iowa processes applications according to their fiscal year, which begins July 1 of every year. Applications should not be submitted before July 1 of 2024. Please look at the nutrition page of the district website for more information.

Applying for Free and Reduced Meals and School Fees can now be done online! Parents can access the application through the parent portal. As always, applications cannot be filled out until after July 1, 2024. Registration fee waivers must be completed by October 4th.

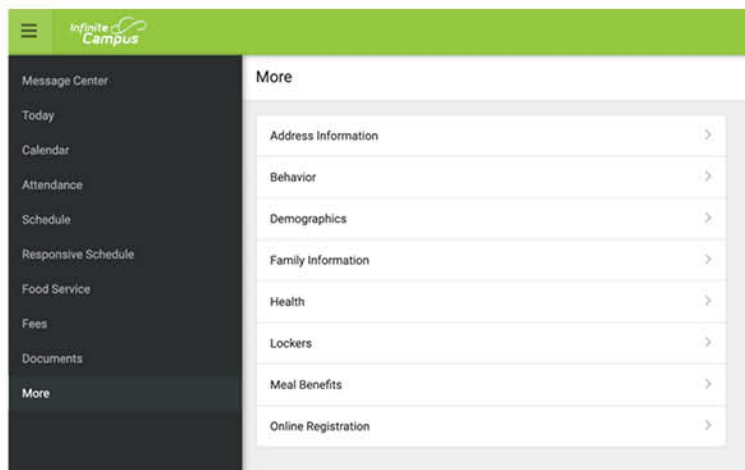

HEALTH SCREENING INFORMATION

The following are required screenings and immunizations mandated by Iowa law. If your child will be entering one of the following grades, you must provide proof of the screening and/or immunization prior to the start of school:

Kindergarten:.....Dental screening, vision screening, physical, all required immunizations for kindergarten

3rd Grade:.....Vision screening

7th Grade:.....Tdap and meningococcal vaccinations

9th Grade:.....Dental screening

12th Grade:.....Meningococcal vaccination

Please note:

1. Parents may submit a religious (signed by parent and notary) or medical (signed by physician) exemption for required immunizations.
2. Students who do not receive a required meningococcal immunization (7th and 12th grades) or have an exemption, will not be able to start school.

HIGH SCHOOL

High school students should bring paper, pencils, and pens to their first day of classes. Individual teachers will list specific materials needed during their first classroom meeting. Students should keep general school supplies (such as folders, etc.) in their backpacks. Students should not rely on the office to supply such items.

Prior to the picture date, each school will distribute order form and payment envelopes. Payment for pictures is required at the time the photo is taken. The purchase of school pictures is optional; however, all students will be photographed for school records. Students are encouraged to wear bright and colorful clothing for their photo.

PROCEDURES FOR FALL OF 2024-25 SCHOOL YEAR:

In the interest of students' safety, parents/guardians/authorized individuals are requested to report directly to the office when picking up their child rather than the child just coming out of the building to a vehicle. Likewise, when a student arrives late or returns to the building following an absence during the school day, the adult should stop in the office and sign the child in.

Other than parents or legal guardians, only persons with prior authorization will be allowed to pick up a child from the school. Anyone who is unfamiliar to teaching staff, including authorized individuals, will be asked to present photo identification before a child is released to them.

PARKING AT THE HIGH SCHOOL

Students will need to park in the lot on the east side (front) of the building or in the north activities lot. There will be no student parking in the west parking lot during school hours.

OPEN CAMPUS

Senior open campus information is available at the high school main office. Parent permission is required for open campus privileges. A parent may grant this permission by signing an open campus permission form and returning it to the high school office. Seniors must return the completed form to the high school office before classes begin.

REMINDER: Students may leave for open campus only during a period in which they are not scheduled for a class. The only students who may leave campus for lunch are those who have 4th period open campus.

TALENTED AND GIFTED

Talented and Gifted (TAG) services are provided for identified students in grades K-12. Please contact your student's classroom teacher or building principal for more information regarding TAG support.

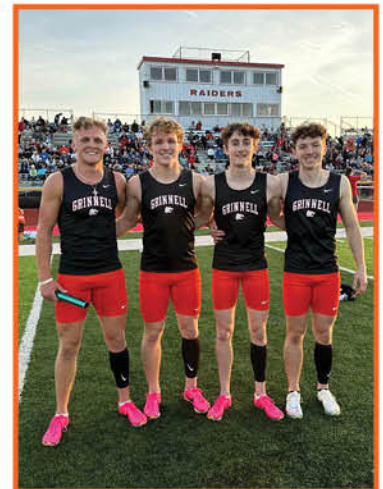
SCHOOL BUS REGULATIONS

Videotapes will only be retained if necessary for use in a student disciplinary proceeding or other matter, as determined necessary by the administration.

OPEN ENROLLMENT

Open Enrollment is the process by which a parent or guardian residing in an Iowa district may enroll their child(ren) into another Iowa school district under the terms and conditions of Iowa Code 282.18 and Iowa Administrative Code 281-17. Visit Dept of Ed to learn more: <https://educate.iowa.gov/pk-12/educational-choice/open-enrollment>

A student who transfers school districts under open enrollment in grades 10 through 12 shall not be eligible to participate in interscholastic contests and competitions during the first 90 school days of transfer. For questions on eligibility, please contact the Iowa Girls High School Athletic Union at (515) 288-9741 or the Iowa High School Athletic Association at (515) 432-2011.

Parents/guardians of open enrollment students may be eligible for transportation assistance. This may be in the form of actual transportation or in the form of a cash stipend.

HOMELESS CHILDREN AND YOUTH

Chapter 33 of Iowa Administrative Code defines "Homeless child or youth" as a child or youth from the age of 3 years through 21 years who lacks a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and includes the following:

1. A child or youth who is sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason; is living in a motel, hotel, trailer park, or camping grounds due to the lack of alternative adequate accommodations; is living in an emergency or transitional shelter; is abandoned in a hospital; or is awaiting foster care placement;
2. A child or youth who has a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designed for or ordinarily used as a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings;
3. A child or youth who is living in a car, park, public space, abandoned building, substandard housing, bus or train station, or similar setting; or
4. A migratory child or youth who qualifies as homeless because the child or youth is living in circumstances described in paragraphs "1" through "3" above.

If you, or someone you know, meets the above definition, contact the district office, 641-236-2700, to receive information on the next steps to make arrangements to enroll the student in school.

PARENTAL RIGHTS

Parents/Guardians in the Grinnell-Newburg Community School District have the right to learn about the following regarding their child's teachers' qualifications: State licensure status, special endorsements for grade level/subject area taught, and baccalaureate/graduate certification/degree. Parents/Guardians may request this information from the Office of the Superintendent by calling (641) 236-2700 or sending a letter of request to the Office of the Superintendent, 925 Broad St, Grinnell, IA 50112.

Life-threatening Food Allergies

The Grinnell-Newburg School District's food allergy task force would like to thank all district parents, staff, and students for their cooperation, compliance, and flexibility as we continue implementing our procedures to manage life-threatening food allergies. We have appreciated the compassionate understanding of our district staff, students, and community members as we work together to ensure that our schools and school functions are welcoming and safe for students who live with life-threatening food allergies and attend our schools.

As a reminder, a copy of the procedures, as well as an FAQ is posted on our district website under "Parent Resources". We encourage you to read these documents as they are a great resource for all of us. Also, should you have any questions about the procedures, or what you may or may not bring to a classroom or event, please contact a building principal, your child's teacher, or the school nurse.

Many children with food allergies can experience some of these common symptoms: hives, itchiness, rash, cough, or sneezing. But others can have a more significant reaction, experiencing vomiting, swelling of the throat, and breathing problems; this is called anaphylaxis and it can lead to death

if not immediately treated. Even if they learn to read labels and avoid certain foods, these children may be exposed to minute, harmful residues by touching doorknobs, tables, and others' hands. For the ever-increasing number of students and their families who are affected and for whom anaphylactic shock could occur within seconds of ingestion or tactile contact with an allergy causing food, this is a serious issue. By providing district-wide procedures, our goal is to create the safest environment possible for those with food allergies.

Our task force can include school staff, administrators, parents, students, or community members. If you would be interested in participating on this taskforce, please reach out to the building principal or school nurse. In some instances, when there is a child with a food allergy in a classroom, the procedures for that classroom or building may be stricter than those required district wide. This is in an effort to create a safe and inclusive learning environment with all of our student's needs in mind.

Once again, we appreciate your support. As an educational environment, we believe in our capacity to educate our families, teachers, and students to better understand and live with life-threatening food allergies.

DO YOU HAVE A CONCERN?

Steps to take when you have a concern within the Grinnell-Newburg School District

Step #1:

Take your concern to the person closest to the problem.

No matter what the problem is, take your concern there first. Whether in the classroom, on the bus, or on the practice field, the quickest and easiest solution is usually found with the staff member most directly involved. It's best if you take time to talk with the school personnel regularly, before problems are encountered. Know who your children's teachers are and how they can be contacted. Tell them when things are going well and communicate any concerns you have quickly and openly. If you call for an appointment to see your child's teachers, why not let them know in advance the general nature of your concern? This gives them the opportunity to ask other staff members for information that might relate to your problem or concern. If a personal visit isn't possible, why not call to state the problem, and during the conversation, offer to call back at a time you both can discuss the situation more in detail. The concern you or your child faces may be a result of an oversight or a misunderstanding that can be easily corrected once brought to the attention of the staff member most directly involved. Give them a chance to tackle the problem first.

Step #2:

Present your concern to the next level.

The principal at each building is responsible for supervision of staff within that particular building. The director of transportation supervises all school bus drivers. Each one is an example of the next level of school personnel you should contact if the staff member closest to the problem hasn't been able to satisfactorily resolve the difficulty. Their ability to help will be improved if you share the steps you have already taken with the staff member closest to the problem. Take time to openly share with them the reasons why you feel uncomfortable dealing directly with the person who is closest to the situation. Supervisory personnel will rarely have access to the information they need to be of immediate assistance and working through them will often require additional time.

Step #3:

Talk with the superintendent of schools.

Sometimes all the best intentions can't solve a problem. When you believe you have taken the problem to the next level but still haven't achieved a satisfactory outcome, the superintendent of schools is the next place to go. Part of a superintendent's job requires attendance at area-wide meetings outside the district. As a consequence, a meeting with the superintendent will probably require some advance planning.

Step #4:

Contact your school board member after other means have been tried.

School board members are elected to represent the interest of all parents and district residents; therefore, you should always feel free to tell them your point of view. School board members do not, however, have direct authority in day-to-day operations. All authority is the result of official actions by a majority of the board at meetings open to the public. The board's primary responsibility is to make policies that guide the school district. Any change in policy requires two readings at two separate public meetings, a procedure that often takes two or more months. Some policy changes may require substantial public input and consultation with the school district's attorney. These requirements often increase the time required for the board to make a response.

So, when should a board member be contacted and what can they do?

Contact a board member...

- After other means to solve a problem have been tried.
- When a policy is being enforced but you believe it results in bad consequences.
- When you believe a policy isn't being enforced.
- When policies or procedures are not enforced fairly for all.

A board member may take one or all of the following actions:

- Informally discuss the issue with the superintendent to consider whether policies or rules would be changed.
- Request to the board president to review the specific policies that relate to the situation.
- Propose new policies for the board's consideration.

Unfairness, misunderstanding, hurt feelings, and conflicts are experiences common to all of us. When children experience these problems at school, it causes difficulty not only for children but also for parents and school staff. These guidelines have been put in place in order to successfully solve problems at school.
