


Front Cover: Graphic depicting growth of GMCS Board Scholars from 249 to 1099 awards.

GMCS Board Scholars

Gallup-McKinley County Schools is proud to recognize the tremendous growth of our Board Scholars program. Since 2018, the number of students excelling in ELA, Math, and Science has increased steadily, with totals rising from 249 scholars in 2018 to more than **1,090** in 2025. Despite the challenges of the COVID-19 pandemic, our students have demonstrated remarkable resilience and achievement, reflecting the hard work of our educators, families, and community. This growth highlights our ongoing commitment to academic excellence and preparing every student for future success.



GMCS Board Scholars on the Rise:

A Decade of Growth and Purpose

Gallup-McKinley County Schools (GMCS) is proud to celebrate the growing number of Board Scholar awards—students recognized for academic excellence by the GMCS Board of Education. This year, 1,090 board scholar awards were earned by GMCS students, reflecting the districts continued commitment to student success. Over the past seven years, the number of Board Scholar awards has risen more than 400%, highlighting the district's sustained focus on academic achievement.

The increased number of GMCS Board Scholar awards is no accident. Over the past nine years, GMCS has transformed itself through intentional action—focusing on the needs of students, creating equity in educational opportunities, empowering staff, and ensuring the quality of instruction in every classroom. This transformation has been supported by new programs, policies, and practices designed to help students and families thrive.

While the GMCS community faces social, economic, and geographic challenges, district leadership remains steadfast in its belief that by focusing on our diverse strengths, we can provide every student the opportunity to become a self-reliant, productive citizen ready to compete locally and globally. Everything that we do is to ensure that every student in our district can be successful.

The work at GMCS is centered in core values—The Whole Child, Cultural Diversity, Excellence, Prosperity,

Community Engagement, and Equity, Equality, and Access—not just in words, but in consistent, measurable action.

The Whole Child

At GMCS, supporting a student's full academic, social-emotional, and physical development is essential. GMCS's "Whole Child" approach ensures that every student is healthy, safe, engaged, supported, and challenged. This vision is reflected in initiatives that strengthen well-being, build confidence, and promote empathy and community connection.

GMCS has ensured that all schools, at the same grade level, are teaching the same standards at the same time to ensure that students who are highly mobile within GMCS continue to learn the same content. GMCS has also invested in teacher supports including the following: standards aligned assessments, classroom level supplies so they do not have to pay out of pocket, free printing of educational materials, exemplar lesson plans by subject aligned to state standards and at the high school level lesson plans have college and career learning opportunities embedded in the plans. This, in addition to multiple professional development opportunities, has helped us to ensure our educational staff are prepared to deliver a quality educational experience to every student.

GMCS has also provided training and support to our counseling and educational staff to help meet the many social

and emotional needs of our students. Empowering our students to make positive choices makes school safer for all. GMCS has also created programs like Teen Court, D.A.R.E, the Vape Task Force, Middle School Bike Clubs, free admission to all GMCS athletic events, and appropriate use of technology to help students to be responsible, learn how to self-regulate and promote digital citizenship. In addition to these programs, GMCS has recently redesigned the student experience for middle school students and sixth grade students. Sixth grade students are being prepared for the challenges and independence of middle schools, and middle school students are being provided more individualized attention as they begin to choose their college, career and civic pathways. These are a few examples of the intentional, multi-pronged activities for supporting students' social and emotional learning which have helped to dramatically reduce discipline referrals.

GMCS also values parental and guardian involvement in their students' educational experience. GMCS works hard to strengthen academic partnerships between families and the classroom by utilizing positive interactions with every student and their family. GMCS Student-led conferences are intended to encourage students to take accountability and responsibility for their learning. Giving a student the opportunity to present their own progress to parents builds confidence and communication skills, both critical components of the GMCS Graduate profile. Additionally, these conferences strengthen partnerships between students, parents, and teachers. They provide all stakeholders with a deeper understanding of the student's educational experience and challenges a student may face. Building these relationships is essential to ensuring trust and continuous communication.



Cultural Diversity

Cultural diversity is one of GMCS's greatest strengths. GMCS celebrates and integrates the cultural backgrounds of its students into the educational experience through curriculum, festivals, and partnerships. This includes bringing in many different types of support to help students find relevance in the instructions they receive.

A shining star with GMCS is our Heritage Language and Culture Department. The GMCS HLC and Instructional team has developed a first-of-its-kind Navajo Language and Culture curriculum with the goal of helping to preserve Navajo language and culture. In educational interactions, a well-prepared environment successfully intertwines with the students' experiences, interactions, and academics fostering students' love of learning and inviting students in. GMCS has incorporated wonderful shifts in our instruction, curriculum, and pacing to show the use and learning of the Navajo Language embedding the cultural teachings of the Diné Way of Life. In

response to these investments, GMCS students, particularly Native American students, have shown significant growth in proficiency, demonstrating the impact of culturally responsive education. Dr. Ophelia M. Sanchez, Director of Cultural Education, shared, "Many of us and our students no longer speak our Diné language, though we may still understand it. While cultural teachings remain, the true strength, meaning, and wisdom of our Diné identity can only be fully expressed through our language. Culture and language are inseparable; they are deeply connected and cannot exist without each other. Our work in language revitalization is vital—once lost, a language takes generations to restore. As language warriors, we are leading this effort to preserve and pass on the Diné language to future generations, who will become the leaders, elders, and ancestors of tomorrow."

Excellence

GMCS's pursuit of excellence is rooted in the belief that every student can succeed. GMCS is committed to providing every student with a highquality, comprehensive educational experience. It is a holistic philosophy that encompasses far more than just high-test scores, focusing on developing students' academic skills, character, and well-being, so they are prepared for a successful future. Excellence is inseparable from equity. Achieving excellence requires providing all students with the resources, instruction, and support they need to succeed. Providing district wide guidance as well as support is essential in ensuring every student has an equitable opportunity at GMCS.

This commitment to excellence has helped our students shine. In person, graduation rates now exceed state averages. While we are proud of this statistic, we also want to be sure our students are ready for the next steps in their lives. GMCS leads the state in College, Career, and Civic Readiness, preparing students not only for graduation but for success in life beyond high school. In elementary school, students begin to explore different types of careers and get to hear from industry-level speakers. In middle school, students begin taking employability skills, another GMCS developed curriculum, and they learn more about what they want to do in their futures through field trips and other opportunities.

In high school, students have the opportunity to join a program of study, take dual credit courses, or join our early college high school. Over 95% of high school students participate in Career Pathway programs, more than 600 high school students are enrolled in our early college high program with the opportunity to receive an associate's degree in addition to a high school diploma, our civic readiness opportunity allows student to explore miliary, police, EMT and other opportunities.

Our students' experiences don't stop in the classroom, GMCS has also created a paid internship program for our high school students. GMCS is utilizing state funds to pay our students to intern at local businesses, governments and within the district. These opportunities allow students to utilize employability skills they learned throughout secondary schooling and workforce responsibility. GMCS also pays for students to participate in local, State and National competitions like Business Professionals of America. Skills USA, Career and Technical Student Organizations, and HOSA-Future Health Professionals to name a few.

Prosperity

Prosperity at GMCS means investing in both people and purpose. GMCS understands that empowering staff and students creates sustainable growth and opportunity.

Investing in our students starts with our most important resource, our staff. In addition to the training, support, supplies and services we have provided to staff, GMCS has implemented the largest salary increases in the district's history, ensuring competitive pay and stability for employees. In addition to these raises, GMCS has offered retention incentives, ranging from \$500 to \$2,500 annually, to acknowledge the dedication of every staff member. GMCS also offers the best benefits package in New Mexico, attracting and retaining top educators. This includes paying 90% of insurance premiums, housing for our county school educators, and additional pay for our specially licensed staff. This combined with dedicated resources, training, and focus on customer service shows our commitment to ensuring our staff's success.

GMCS believes that no student should pay a fee for quality education. This is seen in our commitment to providing school supplies, waving fees to participate in clubs and classes, providing paid internships, providing quality technology, and paying fees for academic associations like National Honor Society. Our students face many challenges and ensuring that they have access to top-tier instruction, experiences, and opportunities helps them to see a prosperous future.

Equity, Equality, and Access

GMCS's mission to ensure equal opportunity for every student is reflected in its work to remove barriers—financial, geographical, and systemic. GMCS Board

and leadership have fought relentlessly to ensure opportunities for our students.

GMCS is a lead plaintiff in the successful Yazzie-Martinez lawsuit which has put more than \$1 Billion into public education in New Mexico. This has created more opportunities to help our most at-risk students. In addition to the successful litigation with Yazzie-Martinez, GMCS staff successfully overturned the State's taking of Impact Aid. The return of Impact Aid has provided the District with up to \$24 Million more per year, from 2020 on.

These courageous fights have helped GMCS to secure vital funding for Native American education, improved the resources we are able to provide to our students, helped to implement college and career opportunities, and provided raises for our staff. Additionally, these funds have allowed GMCS to provide all students with supplies, waiving fees, providing technology, the opportunity to enroll in early college high opportunities, and Career Pathway opportunities.

GMCS has been working to receive Capital Outlay funding to improve our school facilities. GMCS has received more than \$300 million through our Capital Outlay litigation to improve facilities and learning environments district wide. The district has upgraded 9 school heating and cooling systems, is making investments in drainage and paving and has provided upgraded security.

The District is currently building an unprecedented number of new school facilities, including Red Rock Elementary, Tohatchi High School, Crownpoint Middle School, Crownpoint High School, Thoreau High School, McKinley Technical School, Navajo Pine High School, Gallup High School, and a new McKinley Academy Facility. GMCS is also remodeling David Skeet Elementary School and providing housing at that location.

The District has also made transportation investments, including small buses and all-wheel-drive vehicles, to ensure safe, equitable access to education for students in remote areas. We have purchased vehicles for all school site liaisons to help reduce attendance barriers and provide materials directly to chapter houses and homes. Our Transportation department is the backbone of our Career Pathway and Career Technical Opportunities, transporting students every day across the county to colleges, career tech programs, and internships. Our staff drive more than 2 million miles every year!

Community Engagement

GMCS recognizes that success comes from partnership. GMCS continues to deepen its connection with families, local organizations, and tribal communities through open communication and collaboration. Our students need all our communities to support, mentor, and encourage them to success.

GMCS has expanded the information we provide to our communities, parents, and staff. GMCS provides regular, transparent updates and seeks community input through surveys and advisory councils. Our Community, Budget, Parent, and Student surveys provide thousands of responses to help us improve our educational services. GMCS also has Advisory School Councils (ASC) and Parent Advisory Committee (PAC) providing a direct line between families and district decision-makers.

Local businesses and governmental entities have also stepped up to help our students. The District engages with these entities to help provide internship opportunities for our students. These mentors help students learn specific and soft skills to help them succeed. Law enforcement partners are helping implement our Safety Response Protocol and providing student training

and support to help us remain drug and alcohol free. Students' interactions with community members give them the chance to see success in their communities and form bonds with local leaders.

Looking Ahead

As GMCS celebrates the accomplishments of its students and staff, GMCS remains focused on continuous improvement. The progress of the past decade proves that strategic investment, equity, and empowerment work—and that the best is yet to come.

Every student, every school, and every success story adds up to something greater: a community united in the belief that education transforms lives.

As the number of GMCS Board Scholars continues to rise—reaching 1,090 this year—the district's vision of excellence, equity, and cultural strength becomes even more evident. Superintendent Mike Hyatt reflected, "The incredible progress our students have made over the past decade is a direct reflection of the commitment, courage, and heart of the entire GMCS community. Our students are achieving levels never seen before thanks to the strong, unwavering support of our Board of Education. Their vision and investment in our students, staff, and programs have made this transformation possible. The success of our Board Scholars and the academic growth we see across GMCS are not by chance, but they are the result of vears of intentional work by a dedicated staff and a School Board that believes deeply in our students and their potential. I am truly honored to be part of this work with my administrative team and to serve alongside so many devoted individuals who put students first every single day."

"It's nice to see the community come together to cheer on their players and schools," Sena said.








Samentha Platero, who works alongside Sena in the district athletic department, attended as both staff and proud parent.

Olivia Lee, Principal, David Skeet Elementary

Yá'át'ééh. My name is Olivia Lee, and I am honored to serve as the principal of David Skeet Elementary. I am Diné, Navajo, and proudly carry my clans — White Mountain Apache and Red House of the Rainbow People. These clans remind me of who I am, where I come from, and the responsibility I hold to lead with balance, respect, and compassion.

Growing up within Navajo teachings, I learned the

importance of $K'\acute{e}$ — our way of showing respect, kinship, and connection to others. That teaching continues to guide my leadership every day. I believe that when we understand our roots, we grow stronger branches. In our school, I want every child to feel that same sense of belonging — that who they are and where they come from matters.

I take great pride in my culture and honor the beauty of all cultures represented in our community. Our diversity is our strength, and through shared stories, language, and traditions, we create a learning environment filled with understanding, love, and purpose.

I've always believed that education has the power to change the trajectory of a child's life. My journey began with a deep passion for helping students feel seen, valued, and capable of success, no matter their background. Over time, that passion grew into a mission — not just to teach students, but to empower teachers and build systems where every child can thrive.

As a principal, I've worked to create schools where social-emotional learning, strong instruction, and community partnerships come together to make a lasting impact. Education became not just my career, but my calling — to build spaces where both students and staff grow into their fullest potential.

I attended Tohatchi Middle School and High School. I received my Bachelor of Science in Secondary Education from Northern Arizona University, my MA in Mental Health Counseling from Argosy University, and my Ed.S. from the University of New Mexico. I am of the Folded Arms People, born for the Waters-Edge People.

I was inspired to become a teacher while in high school. My band teacher at the time, Mr. Footracer, was the one whom I admired most — and like him, I wanted to become a music teacher. Although I did not become a music teacher, I earned my Bachelor of Science degree in Social Studies. I taught in Arizona schools for about eight years and another sixteen years in New Mexico high schools. I recently transitioned into an administrative position in January of 2024. Thankfully, GMCS allowed me the opportunity to be an Assistant Principal at Kennedy Middle School, where I still am today.

One traditional value that I would like my students to carry with them for the rest of their lives is K'é. Through K'é — the acknowledgment of their clans — students are able to know who their family is. Within the school environment, I believe that if students learn not only their own clans but also those of their classmates and teachers, this will create a school environment of respect and honor. This does not only apply to Navajo students but to other tribes and races as well.

I believe that through the implementation of the clan system in their own lives, students will have greater respect for members of their clans. By learning about each other's clans, students learn who their grandparents, aunts, uncles, brothers, sisters, mothers, or fathers are. Even those who do not have clans can still be respected as siblings, parents, aunts, uncles, or grandparents.

Ask yourself where you want to be in ten years. What career do you want? Where do you want to live? In knowing the answers to those questions, you have created a goal for yourself. Now, every day that you wake up, make choices to attain that goal you have set. You have it in you to achieve this goal. Bear in mind it will take commitment and tenacity on your part — but it is possible. Stay focused.



Ophelia M. Sanchez, Ed.D., Director of Cultural Education

Becoming an educator was never something I originally planned; it happened naturally through my ability to connect with children and being an avid learner myself. My uncle was my spiritual leader; he always reminded me to be strong, share my wisdom, but be humble — a strong step with a soft voice will take your path far. Knowing who you are brings wisdom and strength. Students are our future elders, leaders, and mentors — they are called to help others and lead with hozho — beauty and balance. At the same time, it's important to remain humble and listen, because everyone has something to learn, and listening is the key to true learning.

Students, knowing your culture and where you come from is a powerful source of resilience. Your presence already makes a difference on Mother Earth. Stay strong, grow your wisdom, and keep learning and listening — your goals are within reach. The universe knows who you are, so live fully into the path it has prepared for you.



Sasha Blanco Ramirez, Director of Instruction

My name is Sasha Blanco Ramirez, and this is my 18th year with Gallup-McKinley County Schools. I am a registered member of the Cherokee Nation and belong to the Long Hair Clan on my mother's side.

My mother was a first-generation college graduate who became a third-grade teacher. I didn't realize it at the time, but she would go on to shape my career path as an adult. When I was a sophomore in high school, I helped her with a pumpkin math lesson focused on estimation. Watching her teach and seeing her students' excitement that day sparked something in me — I knew then that I

wanted to become a teacher.

By my senior year, my mother had arranged for me to work half days at Roosevelt Elementary so I could experience what teaching was really like. Eighteen years later, I'm still doing what I love — and I wouldn't trade the journey for anything.

True integrity is doing the right thing, even when no one is watching. It's about staying committed to your values, honoring your word, and taking responsibility for your actions.

Yá'át'ééh! My name is Doreen Earle. I am the Cultural



Education Program Coordinator at GMCS. I am Ma'iideeshgiizhnii (Coyote Pass Jemez), born for Honaghaani (One Who Walks Around). My maternal grandfathers are Kinyaanii (Towering House), and my paternal grandfathers are Tach'iinii (Red Running Water).

My background has been primarily in early childhood education, teaching kindergarten and first grade at various schools on the Navajo Nation. For as long as I can remember, I've had a strong interest in education — even as a child, I would organize 'school' for my younger siblings and cousins during summer breaks.

Over the years, I've been actively involved in school leadership and continually seek ways to strengthen my teaching strategies to better serve our Navajo students. What has truly motivated me to both enter and remain in education is the desire to improve educational opportunities for our Navajo children. I have a deep understanding of the unique challenges they face — whether it's living with grandparents, helping with family responsibilities, or simply traveling long dirt roads to get to school. Because of that, I feel a strong responsibility to make school a place where they feel supported, inspired, and capable of success.

One traditional teaching I would like my students to learn and carry with them is K'é, which represents kinship, respect, and our connection to one another. I also believe that K'é carries within it a sense of resiliency — the understanding that knowing who you are and where you come from gives you strength. When our students learn about their clans and the importance of relationships, they begin to build a foundation of spiritual, physical, and emotional resilience.


Celebrating Culture, Leadership, and Community

GMCS'S CAT SIMULATORS PAVE THE WAY FOR HIGH-TECH CAREER PATHS



Gallup-McKinley County Schools is giving students the opportunity to get hands-on experience with heavy equipment—without ever leaving the classroom. The new CAT Simulator, housed at the Occupational Career Center (OCC) program, allows students to train virtual models of real machinery such as excavators, bulldozers, and loaders.

At a recent School Board meeting, Board Members and Superintendent Mike Hyatt got the chance to experience one of the simulators firsthand. Secretary of the Board Michael Schaaf was the first to take on the challenge by testing his skills behind the controls, gaining a glimpse into how this cutting-edge tool helps prepare students for future careers in construction, mining, and related industries.

"The CAT simulator is fantastic — it's a great opportunity for our students to become proficient in operating heavy equipment. The School Board is very excited to help secure funds to offer these kinds of hands-on learning experiences to our students," said Mr. Schaaf, GMCS Board Member. McKinley County, as

well as national trends, show that jobs in skilled trades are in demand. In September 2025, Forbes Advisor stated "Skilled trades workers are in high demand as well, with nearly 650,000 annual job openings in construction and extraction occupations alone, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics"

The CAT Simulator is part of GMCS's commitment to expanding Career and Technical Education (CTE) opportunities districtwide. Through programs like the OCC, students are introduced to realworld job skills and can earn industry-recognized certifications, helping them graduate ready for college, career, or both.

"The realism of this simulator is impressive," said Superintendent Hyatt. "It gives our students an incredible opportunity to learn safely, build confidence, and develop valuable skills before they ever step into a real machine."

For students interested in trades or heavy equipment operation, the simulator provides an essential

steppingstone—allowing them to practice in a safe, controlled environment while learning precision, safety, and efficiency. These simulators are industry recognized and endorsed to help standardize training, move towards regulatory compliance and certification, and recognize the value of technology in growing the workforce.

By investing in tools like the CAT Simulator, GMCS continues to strengthen its College, Career, and Community Readiness (CCCR) Vision, ensuring students are prepared to meet the workforce needs of the region and beyond.
