

INTRODUCTION

This report contains information concerning general facts, enrollments, student progress, test scores, learning climate, and financial statistics. It is meant to communicate the status of the Fillmore Central Public Schools to the residents of the District. Additional information may be obtained by contacting the Superintendent's office at 402-759-4955.

Fillmore Central Schools has three campus sites, a K-4 elementary located at 17th and H streets in Geneva, a 5-8 middle school campus in Fairmont located at 950 F Street, and a 9-12 High School located at 14th and L streets in Geneva. The entire district is located in Fillmore County, and covers an area of approximately 245 square miles. The Fillmore Central School District began in the 2000-2001 school year, and formed with the merger of the Geneva and Fairmont school districts. Later, parts of the Grafton, Ohiowa, and Strang school districts also joined Fillmore Central.

MISSION STATEMENT

Fillmore Central Public Schools mission is to provide all students the opportunity and support to achieve excellence, develop responsibility, and become life-long learners.



SCHOOL STAFF

The Fillmore Central Public Schools teaching staff has the responsibility of teaching, supervising, and evaluating students. Classroom teachers numbered 47.0 FTE during the 2022-2023 school year. Thirty-five members of our teaching staff have Masters degrees. Support Staff is comprised of secretaries, para-professionals, maintenance personnel, bus drivers, and food service personnel. Support staff totaled 39 positions.

TRANSPORTATION

Fillmore Central Schools provides before school and after school transportation to all our rural students. We also provide a morning and afternoon shuttle to the middle school in Fairmont. Tyke (ages 3-4) transportation is also provided for students with verified disabilities to the pre-school.

CURRICULUM

Fillmore Central Schools is a class III school district, fully accredited by the Nebraska Department of Education. Fillmore Central makes every effort to comply with the rules and regulations of Rule 10, which guides our class offerings and credits of instruction. Fillmore Central spent the 2022–23 school year reviewing the Math textbooks.





SPECIAL SERVICES

Diagnosis, Evaluation, and Services for Special Education, Speech Therapy, Physical Therapy, Occupational Therapy, Licensed Mental Health Practitioner, and School Nurse are provided either through Fillmore Central Schools, ESU 6, Fillmore County Hospital, or by private contract

The SUCCESS program, operated through ESU 6 is housed at the three Fillmore Central buildings. This program provides services for students with Special Needs that cannot be met in the typical classroom environment. During the 2022-2023 school year, SUCCESS had a staff of 3 teachers and 11 para-professionals working in the Fillmore Central Buildings serving 19students.

The TYKE Preschool Program, for students below age 5, is also housed within the Fillmore Central Elementary School. The TYKE program employed 2 teachers and 3 para-professionals, and served 64 students. We also served 13 home-based or at Fillmore County Head Start.

STEERING COMMITTEE

Fillmore Central has a Steering Committee composed of the Superintendent, three building principals, Steering sub-committee chairs, and 2 at-large staff representatives each from the Elementary, Middle School, and High School. This 15 person committee meets 2-3 times a year and is active in working on District needs.



SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT

Fillmore Central Public Schools has a school improvement committee made up of 15-20 members including board members, administrators, teachers, parents, and patrons. The committee works to gather and analyze student performance data and then formulates goals and plans designed to improve upon identified areas for improvement.

During the 2018-2019 school year, Fillmore Central had an external team visitation on March 19th and 20th. Members of the external visitation team included Dr. Mitch Kubicek of Milford Public Schools, Mr. Ken Booth of Centennial Public Schools, and Mr. Matt Uher of Tri-County Public Schools.

The External Visitation to Fillmore Central Public Schools was to assist the school in selecting and fulfilling school improvement goals and plans by adding an outside, objective view of the school improvement processes, enlist the professional advice of colleagues from outside of the school, and increase the depth of understanding for moving forward to achieve school improvement initiatives.


The External Visit also fulfills the Rule 10 requirements that all accredited schools must host an external visit once during a five-year cycle.

Fillmore Central's current school improvement goals are:

- Students in grades K-1 will improve their comprehension when listening to a text.
- Students in grades 2-12 will increase reading comprehension of informational text.


ENROLLMENT

Enrollment (official count is the last Friday in September) at Fillmore Central for 2022-2023 by building was: K-4 (210), 5-8 (160), and 9-12 (178) for a total enrollment of 548. The largest classes were the 11th grade (53) and 3rd grade (52). The smallest class was the 6th Grade (31). Fillmore Central contracted 36 different students with the Heartland Boys Home at various times during the year. There are also 22 students that are home-schooled within our district. Our average daily membership (includes Pre-K) was 598.27 ADM; average daily attendance was 567.30 ADA; Student attendance rate was 94.8%.




ACT TESTING, GRADUATING SENIORS

The ACT consists of curriculum-based tests of educational development in English, Mathematics, Reading, and Science designed to measure the skills needed for success in first year college coursework. The following shows our scores over the past seven years. In 2018 the Nebraska Department of Education made the ACT the state test for Juniors. Beginning in 2018 all juniors were requried to take this test in the spring.





FC Striv at State Softball


Ty Schelkopf and Bret Dunker got the opportunity to broadcast for Striv at the state softball tournament. What a great experience for these young men!








Essay Finalist - Destany T

Fillmore Central's first SNC championship in nearly 20 years.



Dairy Truck
