Overview

The Newell School District monitors student progress through a variety of ongoing formal and informal assessments. Students in grades K-10 utilize MAP reading and math assessments as a part of the comprehensive needs assessment data to assess growth from pre-determined instructional periods.

The Newell School District would update curriculum in the elementary, middle school, and high school to meet the changing standards in education along with provide the teachers and students with up-to-date resources. The updated curriculum choice was a suggestion from many staff members from a 2021 summer survey. Staff for the 2020-2021 had a data retreat at the end of the school year and some of the student's needs are addressed in new curriculum. The data retreat ended with goals for our elementary, middle school, and high school staff members to achieve for the 2021-2022 school year.

Curriculum selection was orchestrated through a staff survey in where respondents addressed the age of the curriculum currently used along with answering the question- "Is this curriculum addressing content standards in their subject"? Staff felt the curriculum was outdated and not addressing content standards. Sample curriculums from textbook companies were received.

In elementary school, there would be updates to the science, math, and phonic curriculums to meet the changing needs for students. The school administration and staff want students to have a strong academic foundation in elementary school. The current elementary curriculum is outdated and does not meet the core needs.

In middle school, updating the social studies curriculum will support staff in teaching the everchanging history of our country and world.

The high school needs to update curriculum in physical science and world history.

Next, we would like to give staff professional development in the summer monthly to curriculum map the new curriculum and to become comfortable with the resources offered by the new curriculum. Professional development would allow for success for teachers and students throughout the school year and would receive compensation for teachers in the summer. Planned units for the upcoming school year would benefit academic success.

Newell school District would use funds to update and improve maintenance of flooring throughout the campus.

- The current lower elementary flooring would be updated with new tile.
- Current upper elementary, middle school and lower elementary carpeted floors in hallways receiving multiple grades daily travel would be replaced with tile.
- The century old high school building would have any current carpeting (15 yr. age) replaced and the basement painted floor would be tiled.
 - Increasing the ease of cleaning will decrease the presence of germs and bacteria though out the campus, improving student and staff health and well-being.

Project #1 \$114,575

Newell School District would like to abate asbestos in the lower elementary flooring and high school weight room. The lower elementary services preschool for 3- and 4-year-old and four- and five-year-old, kindergarten, vocal kindergarten through twelfth grade, speech/physical therapy/occupational therapy offices for preschool through twelfth grade, library for all students, and a DDN for virtual classes taken by our ninth through twelfth students. The lower elementary flooring has asbestos in the mastic that adheres the tiles to the foundation. The Newell School District would like to abate the asbestos in the summer for 2022. The Newell School District will utilize the Board of Education and subcommittees such as the buildings and grounds and budget committees to meet to make the best decision regarding contractors. After the floors are abated in the lower elementary, the school will replace the flooring in the hallways and classrooms.

Project #2 \$319,025

The Newell School District would like to replace the carpet in the upper elementary, middle school, and lower elementary buildings. In this project we will have carpet in the classroom and tiling in the hallways. The carpet is at least 15 years old and traps in germs that are harmful for students, staff, and patrons. The classrooms in the upper elementary, middle school, and lower elementary have carpet in them and I would like to replace the current carpet with carpet and tiling that is easier to maintain. We would like to keep the carpet flooring in the classroom to not create an echoey environment which would not make it conducive for learning. The tiling in the hallways would improve cleaning procedure for our custodial staff. Also, we will be replacing the flooring in our weight room in our high school from carpet to rubber flooring. The Newell School District will utilize the Board of Education and subcommittees such as the buildings and grounds and budget committees to meet to make the best decision

regarding contractors. The Newell School District would like to complete this project in the summer of 2022. Updating flooring in the ag/science and high school for the 2023-2024 school year. In this project we will have carpet in the classroom and tiling in the hallways. The carpet is at least 15 years old and traps in germs that are harmful for students, staff, and patrons. The classrooms in the upper elementary, middle school, and lower elementary have carpet in them and I would like to replace the current carpet with carpet and tiling that is easier to maintain. We would like to keep the carpet flooring in the classroom to not create an echoey environment which would not make it conducive for learning. The tiling in the hallways would improve cleaning procedure for our custodial staff. We would not replace flooring in storage areas in the high school and upstairs in the wrestling room in the Austin Auditorium the Newell School District will utilize the Board of Education and subcommittees such as the buildings and grounds and budget committees to meet to make the best decision regarding contractors. Project #3 \$140,375 Newell School District would like to do a remodel of our current \$18,044 was agriculture/science building. The remodel would consist of adding spent on appropriate electrical outlets to our current agriculture classroom and engineering making this classroom a woodshop area. The new classroom would be fees. connected to our current industrial technology classroom and lab areas. We would move the agricultural room to the south end of the ag/science \$14,515building and remodel two classrooms to have one as a classroom for our casewoork agriculture teacher and one as lab area for our agriculture teacher. The removal remodel would include one door to improve student and staff access between rooms along with windows on two walls to increase supervision of \$112,116 instructor while using both classrooms. Lastly, we should remodel our left current kitchen area in our special education room to allow students and staff to use the kitchen area for our food science course taught by our agriculture teacher. The Newell School District would look for contractors during the 2022-2023 school year and plan remodeling for the summer of 2023. The Newell School District will utilize the Board of Education and subcommittees such as the buildings and grounds and budget committees to meet to make the best decision regarding contractors. Project #4 \$63,825 Remodel boys' and girls' bathrooms in the lower elementary building. We would get new toilets, stalls, sinks for both bathrooms. We will discuss the project in building and ground committee meetings as well as school board meetings. We will complete the project in the summer of 2024. Project #5 \$23,274 Internet wiring updates all cabling from access points to servers to Category

6A.

Project #6	\$83,316
Newell School District will be doing propane and boiler services and repairs. The project was in response to an inconsistent heating system for the school. The project deals with a three-prong approach with making sure the propane task provides clean propane to the boiler system. The next part of the project is to replace the vaporizer near the propane tank. Lastly, we will upgrade the second stage regulator at the building to deliver low pressure to the building, eliminating three regulators from the system. This will require replacement of all gas piping within the building between the upgraded regulator and the boiler appliance regulator. To get this work done before the winter season, it is recommended that 2-4 mechanical contractors be allowed to bid on this work immediately and start as soon as possible. The Newell School Board approved the propane and boiler service repairs in the fall of 2023 and will complete the project in the fall of 2023.

Stakeholders representing the interests of children with disabilities, English learners, children experiencing homelessness, children and youth in foster care, migratory students, children who are incarcerated, and other underserved students.

The Newell School District will use our school improvement committee to explain ARP ESSER funds and possible uses for these funds. We will focus on informing the public on how we can use the funds and have an open ear for possible ways to use the funding. The school improvement committee consists of administration, school board members, teachers, and parents.

Newell School District will work appropriately with all civil rights and disability rights organizations as needed to hear the needs and desires of those subgroups and work in collaboration to seek mutual resolution on issues between the district and their organization.

The public

The Newell School District will inform the public through monthly school board meetings, articles in the newspaper, and a public meeting regarding ARP ESSER funding.

Newell School District will work appropriately with all civil rights and disability rights organizations as needed to hear the needs and desires of those subgroups and work in collaboration to seek mutual resolution on issues between the district and their organization.

District Assurance of Regular Review

The South Dakota Department of Education will collect assurances from superintendents that ARP ESSER Plans have been reviewed, available for public comment, and amended, if necessary, at these points during the school year:

- December 2021 (in conjunction with December Child Count)
- June 2022 (in conjunction with Year-End Sign-off)
- December 2022 (in conjunction with December Child Count)
- June 2023 (in conjunction with Year-End Sign-off)

To facilitate transparency, the department will post the link to each school district's plan on its website. It will be the responsibility of the district to ensure its link remains valid.
