Dayton voters will see two measures from Dayton School District on the February 13, 2024 election: a \$4.9 million Educational Programs and Operations (EP&O) Levy, and a \$5.1 million Capital Levy. Both levies would run for four years, collected in 2025-2028.

What is a levy and what does it fund?

A levy is a short-term, locally approved property tax that allows a school district to pay for programs and services that the state does not fund, or only partially funds, as part of "basic education." Funds from each type of levy are only allowed to be used for specific purposes. For example, funds collected for an EP&O levy may not be used for construction, renovation, or building projects. This is why Dayton needs to run both an EP&O and a Capital levy.

EP&O Levy

An Educational Programs and Operations, or EP&O Levy, is used to make up the difference between money provided by the state vs. what it actually costs the school district to fund student programs and services. An EP&O levy may be approved for up to four years. In Dayton, the EP&O Levy would help pay for:

- Career & Technical Education (CTE) and Vocational programs
- * Athletics
- * Extra-curricular activities, field trips, and clubs such as Dayton FFA, Trap Club, Robotics, etc.
- District operations, including support staff
- Special education
- Food services
- Transportation
- ...and more!

Dayton voters approved our last 4-year EP&O levy in 2020, and it will expire in December 2024. If approved by local voters on February 13th, the 2024 EP&O levy will simply replace our expiring levy.

Capital Levy

A Capital Levy is used to fund things like modern technology and smaller building and renovation projects. A capital levy may be approved for up to six years. In February 2020, Dayton voters approved a 4-year Capital Levy in the amount of \$700,000. The following projects were funded thanks to voter approval of the 2020 Capital Levy:

- Computers for every student
- Electronic outside entrances
- Updated phone system
- Speakers installed for communication in all areas and teacher stations

If approved, the upcoming 2024 Capital Levy would fund projects and improvements across <u>all</u> Dayton school buildings, including:

Middle/High School Projects:

- Air filtration for science room
- Foods classroom remodel
- Auditorium update
- Exterior refresh
- Gym roof
- Vocation-Ag doors

Elementary Projects:

- New carpeting
- Library remodel + furniture
- New security gate
- Lift update

- Asphalt
- Concrete
- Fencing



- Dayton School District has two separate measures on the February 13th special election: a 4-year EP&O levy for \$4.9 million, and a 4-year Capital Levy for \$5.1 million.
- Funds from the EP&O levy help pay for educational programs and services such as athletics, extracurricular activities and clubs, CTE and Ag programs, support staff, transportation, and much more
- Funds from the capital levy will pay for multiple renovations and improvements across our school campuses
- Ballots should arrive in mailboxes the third week of January
