

We are focused on identifying and supporting students at all levels who experience math difficulties. With individualized learning opportunities tailored to each students' strengths and weaknesses, students will receive 40 minutes of intervention four to five days a week. With Math customized to students needs and small group experiences, we aim to increase student confidence through successful experiences and reduce the anxiety that sometimes comes within the subject of Math. Teachers and paraprofessionals will run each group so students get to experience hands-on learning

strategies with their peers fostering a strong foundation for future math learning.
