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INTRODUCTION:

North Little Rock School District is a large, urban, public/charter school district with approximately 8000 students enrolled. NLRSD students represent a diverse set of perspectives within North Little Rock, with 74% of the students coming from low-income families and 8% classified as English Language Learners. 57.1% of students identify as Black/African American, 25.8% identify as White, 11.46% identify as Hispanic/Latino, .95% identify as Asian, and 0.53% identify as American Indian.

The NLRSD counselors strive to create a comprehensive counseling program to address the many needs of this large and diverse student body. Outlined below is the NLRSD counselors' plan to use leadership, advocacy, collaboration, and data analysis to help all students succeed academically, socially, emotionally, and in their future career paths.

We believe it is essential to help all students academically achieve and develop a vision for their futures. Academic growth cannot be separated from emotional and career growth; therefore, we will focus on each student's holistic growth in all three areas. To achieve the total growth potential for each student, North Little Rock School District Counseling Program will provide academic, career, and personal/social growth through counselor classroom visits, providing responsive services, including individual/group counseling, consultation with teachers and families, crisis intervention, referral services, and facilitating communication among parents, faculty, and administration.

Positive, healthy relationships are critical for students to be successful. The following people support our students: classroom teachers, school counselors, administrators, parents, paraprofessionals, reach associates, multi-classroom leaders, school-based mental health providers, school nurses, parent engagement professionals, campus supervisors, food service, custodial staff, and human service workers.

NLRSD 2023-2024 Comprehensive Counseling Program Student Goal

NLRSD will reduce its office discipline behavior referrals by 5% from 6195 to 5886 during the 2023-2024 school year, as identified by IBM Cognos reports.* In the wake of COVID-19, student discipline referrals have increased nationwide. Reducing discipline infractions will help ensure that students are present in the learning environment rather than being suspended and prepared for life after school.

- Discipline reports will be monitored biweekly to identify frequent offenders to add to the counseling support list.
- Counselors will create classroom guidance lessons to help address interpersonal conflict, bullying, and other behaviors that cause discipline infractions.
- Counselors will work closely with school administrators to provide individual and/or group counseling with students at-risk of behavior incidents.
- The NLRSD implemented Positive Behavior Intervention and Supports in the 2023-2024 school year.

Division of Counselor Time

School counselors seek to ensure the majority of time each day is directed toward providing direct or indirect student services. By being deliberate about the division of time, school counselors can support students in a way that reflects the school counselor's training and knowledge.

School counselors will spend at least 90% of their time engaged in direct or indirect student services such as the following:

- Individual Counseling
- Individual Student Planning
- Small-Group Counseling
- Classroom Guidance
- Orientation of new students
- Student conferences
- Consultation with parents, teachers, and administrators
- Contributing members (but not chairs) of 504, IEP, ALE, RTI, PBIS, Crisis Management, and other committees that seek to help students achieve success.
- Collaboratively create student schedules each year to help students achieve academic, personal, and career goals.

School counselors will not spend approximately 10% of their time engaged in other activities related to management, foundation, and accountability to sustain the effectiveness of the direct and indirect student services. These activities include the following:

- Meetings
- Committees
- Data entry
- Test Coordination
- Data analysis
- Tracking the use of time

SECTION 3: DELIVERY

The following goals of the North Little Rock School District Counseling Program helps to support the program's philosophy by outlining different areas of focus that are in line with the American School Counselor Association national model. These services include tiers to ensure that all students have the support they need from the guidance curriculum, individual counseling, and other responsive services.

School Guidance Curriculum

Classroom guidance is a critical component of school counseling since it allows the counseling staff to begin to shape the school culture by providing structured opportunities for student emotional, academic, and career growth. Classroom guidance also allows the counselor to directly impact all students. Visiting classrooms and providing digital lessons allows counselors to positively affect students' lives.

Counselors will draw from the following topics:

- Issues identified by the Annual Needs Assessment.
- Effective interpersonal communication skills.
- Conflict resolution and problem-solving.
- Study skills.
- College and Career Readiness
- Self Awareness.
- Substance abuse.
- Diversity.
- Student success plans for high school course planning, career exploration and planning, and goal setting.

Classroom Guidance sessions in the State of Arkansas are limited to forty minutes per session with no more than three sessions per day, and ten sessions per week.

Social/Emotional Learning (SEL)

At the secondary level, this will take place through advisory/flex and classroom visits. Elementary counselors will provide guidance lessons to each class to support the

social-emotional needs of their student body. The following resources will be used to enhance the SEL curriculum:

- Xello College and Career Readiness software.(Grades 6-12)
- Paws in Jobland Career Awareness software (Grades K-5)
- Ripple Effects software.
- Arkansas Guide for Life

<u>Individual Student Planning</u>- School counselors will meet with students individually to offer assistance with school, careers, and personal/social success.

Individual & Group Counseling

School counselors are highly trained professionals at affecting life change. Individual and group counseling are tools that may be employed to assist students in making a positive life change. These forms of counseling allow students to find individualized assistance with navigating problems concerning other students and/or teachers, emotional problems, career planning, crisis intervention, and other issues that may interfere with success in the school environment. School counselors may use individual and group counseling to competently combat common problems faced by students. Some examples of these issues are:

- Anger Management and Conflict/Resolution
- Coping with Life Changes
- Anxiety/Test Anxiety
- Study Skills
- Career Exploration
- Depression/Sadness
- Grief
- Self-Discovery
- Attendance

Online/Virtual

Counselors will maintain a Google Classroom. This learning platform will provide resources focusing on issues important to students and parents. In the event of school transitioning partially or completely virtual, counselors will establish daily opportunities for students to interact online via Google Meets individually, or as a group. A link will be available to students who are feeling anxious, depressed, overwhelmed, or need assistance inside the Counselor's Google Classroom.

Academic Advising, Student Success Plans and Career Exploration

Beginning in the sixth grade, students are introduced to Xello career inventories and start thinking about life after high school. During their eighth grade year, they will create a student success plan through the Xello platform. This is an individualized plan to help the student understand the path forward academically towards their future desired career.

This process will help the student develop career goals and understand the type of post-secondary training required to achieve this goal. This process will continue throughout high school as students update their plans of study to reflect new insights into future career direction as they take annual career inventories. Xello is an online platform that allows students to create career and academic smart goals, plan all of their courses for high school, see accelerated learning options, take career interest inventories that help them connect current learning with future work, and plan for college, etc. The students can schedule time with their school counselor to further develop the plan. This student success plan will function in:

- Guiding along the pathway to graduation
- Guiding students in goal-setting experiences
- Addressing accelerated learning opportunities
- Addressing academic deficits and accessibility of resources
- Providing student assessments and interest inventories
- Helping with Career Planning and Exploration
 - Relationship between classroom performance and success in school and beyond
 - The advantages of completing career certifications and internships
 - Identify career interests and aptitudes

At the elementary level, counselors will incorporate a variety of different career exploration methods into their guidance lessons. Career curriculum may include: Career/Human Bingo, a kid-friendly game that brings awareness to various jobs and careers but also allows teachers and staff to share the educational experiences that led them to their careers or jobs; Dress For The Future (students will be allowed to dress as the person they would like to be when they grow up) allow students to bring someone in to share their particular job or career and provide a little background information of required skills; Paws in Jobland is a virtual career exploration curriculum that allows students to begin exploring personal interests and careers.

Response Services- School counselors will be available to meet with students individually or in groups in response to intrapersonal or interpersonal struggles. Counselors will also be prepared to deal with crises and provide consultation support to faculty and administration. During the 2022-2023 school year, the Mobile Crisis Team was deployed five times due to school/apartment fires, tornados in our community, and various other crises. The district's counselors are divided into three mobile crisis teams. The following process is used to request assistance for services:

- 1. School Counselor will contact the District Head Counselor requesting support.
- 2. District Counselor will notify the Mobile Crisis team for alert to pivot to requested location.
- 3. District Counselors will contact support services as needed (mental health agencies, faith-based, etc.)
- 4. The District Mental Health team will debrief.

<u>Orientation and Transitions</u>- New students to the district will be allowed to tour their new school and will be informed of school policies. They will also be allowed to connect to other students in their building, which may include peer-to-peer connections or welcome bags. Secondary students enrolling will meet with their school counselor to talk about academic status and identify a path to success.

Transition and orientation to high school will be held each spring for the rising 9th-grade class. Freshman will visit NLRHS for scheduling, building tours, and orientation. Students will be bussed from NLRMS to NLRHS to individually meet with high school staff to plan their high school curriculum and address questions and concerns. All incoming 9th graders will be enrolled in a year-long Freshman Orientation class to learn skills to succeed in high school.

Transition and orientation to middle school will be held each Spring for the rising 6th grade class. . Staff from the 6th grade campus will visit all nine Elementary schools to provide information regarding scheduling and the middle school experience. Students will be provided an opportunity to tour the middle school campus before they begin their middle school journey.

All upcoming Kindergarten students in the NLRSD are invited to attend Kindergarten Round-Up each Spring at their local elementary school. At Kindergarten Round-Up, families and their students will have the opportunity to complete all paperwork for registration, tour the elementary campus, and learn new Kindergarten expectations and procedures at their new school.

Responsive Services Statement

Counselors are equipped with a wealth of resources to connect students and their families with agencies and organizations that may provide additional assistance. Counselors have a <u>list</u> of mental health agencies that have agreements to work with NLRSD. Counselors may provide tools for parents experiencing a crisis as needed.

As experts in life change, counselors will also be a consultation resource for educators. Teachers and staff often need someone to offer constructive and creative strategies and provide a listening ear. Addressing and evaluating the mental well being of our staff is critical in creating a positive school culture.

• Counselors will provide appropriate groups to help deal with specific issues.

- Students and faculty will have access to a counselor in a time of crisis.
- Students and faculty will be connected with outside agencies as needed.

Bullying

Parents and students in the NLRSD who wish to report bullying will find instructions and a link to our Anti-Bullying handbook on the district website here: https://www.nlrsd.org/page/how-to-report-bullying. The North Little Rock School District defines bullying as the intentional harassment, intimidation, humiliation, ridicule, defamation, or threat or incitement of violence by a student against another student or public school employee by a written, verbal, electronic, or physical act that may address an attribute of the other student, public school employee, or person with whom the other student or public school employee is associated and that causes or creates actual or reasonably foreseeable. Bullying will not be tolerated in the North Little Rock School District! The North Little Rock School District, in collaboration with students, families, and staff, strives to provide a safe and healthy environment that promotes positive relationships, camaraderie, and conflict management strategies.

Bullying prevention and intervention will begin by thoroughly defining the term bullying to students through bullying prevention guidance lessons and faculty through required PD. Students will learn through guidance the difference between 'being a snitch' and 'asking for help.' NLRSD-certified staff is required to participate in professional development biannually in bullying prevention. Bullying prevention and intervention will include students learning better social and emotional skills through guidance lessons. Students identified as the victim of bullying will have an F1 Bullying form filled out by a school counselor or administrator to get the student statement and be submitted to the administration for the investigation, intervention, and discipline of the offending party. Counselors will follow up with students to provide emotional support. F1 bullying report forms also available the **NLRSD** are on (https://nlrsd.jotform.com/212704493277055) and may be completed by any parent, student, or stakeholder to bring administrative attention to bullying issues. New for the 2023-2024 school year, "STOP it," an anonymous bullying reporting app, helps encourage witnesses and victims of bullying to report misbehavior to improve the school climate.

Suicide Prevention

Suicide Prevention will involve suicide awareness through guidance lessons. Counselors will meet with any students who report intent to harm themselves (or others), notify parents, and provide parents with information on how to access appropriate help in the event of a crisis, such as going to the emergency room or being assessed in an

inpatient mental health facility. Counselors will document this interaction and follow up with the student upon return to school. Our 6-page suicide

Systems Support Statement

In order to continue to actively work to keep the school counseling program up-to-date and relevant, school counselors will engage in continuing education by attending workshops around the state to provide training and networking on topics. Counselors will also stay up-to-date and relevant by attending conferences on school counseling and participating in professional state and national organizations that promote the future direction of effective school counseling. Counselors will strive to keep current on relevant issues to students, schools, and careers.

- Counselors regularly attend conferences and participate in local and national school counseling organizations.
- Counselors gather data, analyze, and act based upon it.
- Counselors will be advocates for ALL students, parents, and staff.
- Counselors will meet monthly, alternating between district-wide and grade levels (elementary, middle, and high school).
- Guest speakers will be brought in to provide resources and training.

SECTION 4: ACCOUNTABILITY

Data Analysis

North Little Rock School District Counseling Program will carefully collect and analyze data related to student needs, as well as data about the counseling program in order to drive decisions regarding the direction of the program. Counselors look for trends based on data and reports that can identify areas of need among different genders, ethnicities, languages, levels of academic rigor, grades, teachers, and socioeconomic status. Using data helps counselors address issues that arise in the following areas:

- Behavioral problems
- Student academic progress
- Student emotional needs.
- Career and post-secondary education decisions
- Program effectiveness
- Equity issues
- Achievement gaps

Monitoring & Reporting Program Progress

There are three types of data collected: Process Data, Perception Data, and Results Data. Process Data describes what happened and who made it happen. Perception Data is what students and other stakeholders thought about what happened. Results data focuses on using empirical data to demonstrate effectiveness. Each year the school counseling program will assess the different forms of data to determine progress towards established Specific Measurable Attainable Realistic Time Based (SMART) goals and other areas of identified growth. Summary data from the previous year's goal(s) will be published in the updated counseling plan each year. The counseling program will also look at the data generated from the use-of-time assessments to determine how to realign the counselors' time with the best practice structurally.

Administrative Activities

School counselors in the North Little Rock School District are participatory members only (they do NOT chair) for the 504, IEP, LPAC, PBIS, RTI, Behavior RTI, and ALE meetings.

School counselors in secondary schools are also not assigned hallway, bus, cafeteria, or other forms of duty but are assigned duty at the elementary levels. School counselors at NLRSD assist with standardized testing but are not the building test coordinator. Secondary counselors are responsible for the master schedule and everything related to scheduling students; the bulk of this is completed during non student attendance days.

Conclusion

The Counselors of the NLRSD will work to develop the knowledge, abilities, and character in order for our student's to achieve lifelong goals and become contributing members of a global society by equipping students with information, resources, support, and opportunities. As a team, we are committed professionals who will collaborate with all stakeholders of the NLRSD to ensure the implementation of this counseling plan.
