Pumpkin Pie? Who is She? -A Review of Sweet Potato Pie

If you're like me, you hate the flavor of pumpkin. And yes, we are very rare, but I am here to represent my community. Believe it or not, there is a better alternative to the god awful pumpkin pie for Thanksgiving. The wonderful, fantastic SUPER FOOD called sweet potatoes.

Sweet Potato Pie is creamier, sweeter, and much more texturally satisfying than pumpkin pie could ever dream to be. PLUS, it's a super food packed full of vitamins and nutrition. I have been making sweet potato pie for Thanksgiving for coming on 4 years now. Every year, I use the recipe from NYT Cooking (linked below) with some minor tweaks. I have found it to be the show stopping dessert at my family functions.

The recipe is fairly easy. While yes, you can put sweet potatoes in the microwave to cook them, I prefer to either grill them in a charcoal grill, or bake them in the oven at 400 for around 45 minutes. This will give you the good Caramelization, which is basically a fancy word for the same taste that caramel has. Burning the correct amount of sugars tastes yummy.

Other changes I made included using 3 eggs and heavy cream, adding the seasonings of a pumpkin pie, and using a brown sugar-white sugar ratio. The use of Evaporated Milk in this recipe was a wartime fix to the shortage of heavy cream. However, heavy cream is thankfully not in short supply right now, and will add richness. Adding extra eggs also adds richness and contributes to a more delicate melt-in-your-mouth feel. For the spices, add 1/4 teaspoon of cinnamon, 1/4 teaspoon of allspice, and 1/8 teaspoon of nutmeg to bring in the spirit of fall. The last substitution I did was a brown sugar-white sugar ratio. This calls back to that Maillard Reaction we were talking about earlier as well as simple sweet potato etiquette. I opted for a 1/2 cup of brown sugar and 1/4 cup of white sugar. This ensures proper texture while adding that molasses taste.

Thanksgiving Fun Facts

Thanksgiving is right around the corner. Here is a little knowledge to share around your table this Holiday!

FIRST THANKSGIVING

During the autumn of 1621, at least 90 Wampanoag joined 52 English people at what is now Plymouth, Massachusetts, to mark a successful harvest. It is remembered today as the "First Thanksgiving." It wasn't until the mid-19th century that a national Thanksgiving holiday was established by Abraham Lincoln.

TOUCHDOWN!

The Detroit Lions and the Chicago Bears played each other on Thanksgiving Day, 1934 to start the mark of a tradition. The 1934 Lions had not allowed a touchdown until their eighth game and entered the game with the Bears with a 10-1 record. They would go on to defeat the reigning champions 19-16. The Thanksgiving Tradition was then born in Detroit, as they have played every year since. In 1966, the Cowboys decided they wanted a piece of the pie, and so they also play a game on Thanksgiving.

PARDONING THE TURKEY

This event began during the Civil War when Tad Lincoln asked his father to spare a turkey named Jack from a holiday meal. President Abraham Lincoln obliged his son and pardoned the fortunate turkey. Years later in 1947, President Harry Truman pardoned the first National Thanksgiving Turkey. Every year since, the National Turkey Federation has raised a turkey to participate in the ceremony at the White House. The turkey will live out her remaining years at the Frying Pan Park's Kidwell Farm, a petting farm for children in Herndon, Virginia.

FOOD SCIENCE: MAILLARD REACTION

For many of us, roasted turkey is a Thanksgiving staple. But why does it taste better than say, boiling a turkey? The answer is in amino acid. The Maillard reaction is a chemical reaction between an amino acid and a reducing sugar. Like caramelization, it is a form of non-enzymatic browning. The reactive carbonyl group of the sugar interacts with the nucleophilic amino group of the amino acid. This process accelerates in an alkaline environment because the amino groups do not neutralize. In the process, hundreds of different flavor compounds are created.
