

From the Desk of the Superintendent

The first nine weeks of school is almost in the books with the first quarter ending on Friday (10-17-25). With the end of the first quarter also comes the wrapping up of the fall sports. The softball program ended their season last week, the cross country team is competing in districts this week, the football team is playing in their last regular season game on Friday, and the volleyball team has only the conference tournament left before playing in the subdistrict in a couple of weeks. The next few days will determine whether any of the fall sports will extend their season in the postseason. Below is some information on school enrollment, NSAA classification, and a reminder about the school's attendance policy.

School Enrollment

The 2025–2026 student enrollment currently stands at 379 students in grades PK–12. This total includes over 100 option students from the surrounding area. The elementary enrollment (PK–6) is 189 students, while the secondary enrollment (grades 7–12) is 190 students.

NSAA Classification

NSAA classifications for Winter and Spring athletics/activities have not yet been published. However, based on current enrollment numbers:

- Boys' teams are expected to compete in Class C or C2 for basketball, golf, track, and possibly wrestling, and in Class D for cross country (and possibly wrestling).
- Girls' teams will likely participate in Class D for cross country and Class C for softball, volleyball, basketball, girls' wrestling, and track.
- Play Production and Speech will continue competing in Class C, consistent with recent years.

Attendance Matters

Each October, I use the newsletter to emphasize the importance of regular school attendance and punctuality for both elementary and secondary students. The reason behind this is simple—research consistently shows that attendance is the number one factor in student success. Unfortunately, this message doesn't reach everyone, and that's why we are highlighting it again.

Key Points from the Attendance Policy:

(The full policy is available in the **student handbooks**, located on the school's website.)

Reporting Absences:

When a student is absent for all or part of the day, parents should call the school office (928-2131) by 9:00 a.m. This helps ensure student safety and serves as official notification. If no contact is made by 10:00 a.m., local law enforcement may be contacted.

Shared Responsibility:

As stated in the handbook:

"The establishment and maintenance of desirable habits of punctuality and attendance is a shared responsibility of parents, students, and the school." Without this shared commitment, students may struggle academically.

Absence Limits:

Any student who exceeds 10 absences in a class per semester may lose credit for that class. If there are extenuating circumstances, parents/guardians may appeal by contacting the school within 10 school days of receiving notice of potential credit loss.

Activity Participation:

Students who miss more than 10 days per semester may also be removed from extracurricular activities.

Tardies:

After the third tardy, additional tardies begin counting toward a student's total absences. Repeated tardiness may lead to make-up time or other consequences, such as loss of field trip or extraduty privileges.

Excessive Absence Notices:

These are sent after a student reaches 4–5 absences or tardies. Continued issues may prompt a meeting involving parents, the student, administrators, and/or the school counselor to develop a plan for improvement.

Attendance Intervention Plans:

These plans may include support such as:

- Medical or behavioral health evaluations
- Educational counseling
- Referrals to community services
- Family or individual counseling
- Coordination with external support agencies

If attendance does not improve and the student is absent for more than 20 days (or the hourly equivalent), the school must notify the County Attorney for habitual truancy, in accordance with Neb. Rev. Stat. §79-209. Referrals may also occur earlier if needed.

 Medical Records related to absences may be shared with the County Attorney as part of this process.

How Parents Can Help

- Parents can support student attendance by:
- Scheduling appointments outside of school hours when possible
- Avoiding family trips during school days
- Ensuring children wake up on time to catch the bus or arrive on time
- · Explaining the importance of daily attendance and punctuality
- Supporting the school's policies on absences and tardiness

Why Attendance Matters


- Consistent attendance helps:
- Students stay on track academically
- · Teachers spend less time reteaching
- Office staff focus on duties beyond absence verification
- The district maintains stronger attendance rates, which affect state aid funding
- A drop in attendance may lead to reduced funding from the state.

Final Reminder

Regular attendance and punctuality are essential for academic and lifelong success. Help give your child the best opportunity to succeed by ensuring they are in school every day and on time.

Learning from the Past, Leading the Future

The school year is off to a great start...hard to believe we are almost done with the first quarter already! 5th (American History) and 6th (World History) are two of my favorite subjects to teach and we are off and running! The 6th grade have been learning about Ancient Mesopotamia...which includes learning a parody song (some of you parents may be hearing it on repeat \odot), and learning about their religion, social structure, arts, inventions (wheel and arch), and government, such as Hammurabi's Code. These are all areas that will be covered in each unit.

The 5th grade will be learning about the state government and participating in the Kid Governor program over the next couple months. Nebraska just recently joined the program and I am excited to be able to have the students be part of the inaugural year here in our state! Here is an explanation of the program from their website:

Kid Governor® empowers 5th graders to change the world. This groundbreaking approach to civic education immerses students in a real election for their state's Kid Governor, a fellow 5th grader who will represent them during a one-year term of active leadership. More than a contest and not just about the position of governor, the program teaches important lessons about state government, voting, elections, and civic participation. This annual program provides 5th graders the experience of nominating one student candidate from their school and voting in an authentic statewide election. Classes can vote in the election, nominate a student to run for office, or both! Participants identify issues impacting their community and state, research solutions, create platforms to address them, and make campaign videos. Schools run primaries to select nominees; each school's winner advances to the state level.

In November, 5th graders across our state watch and evaluate the campaign videos of seven final candidates. They then participate in a statewide election, casting their votes for the student and platform they support. The student receiving the most votes is elected Kid Governor and serves a one-year term of leadership and advocacy. They work with Civic Nebraska and their Cabinet to fulfill their campaign platform and encourage students to make a difference on the winning campaign issue in their own communities.

Kid Governor® is a national, award-winning civics program led by [affiliate organization] and created by <u>The Connecticut Democracy Center</u>. Launched in Connecticut in 2015, Kid Governor® is now a national movement with programs in other states. Visit <u>kidgovernor.org</u> to learn about the national program.

We have talked about the levels of government in the past with our Election unit for the Presidential Race, but this will be an awesome experience for the kids to actually have a voice in electing the first Kid Governor for Nebraska! I am excited to get started on this unit in the upcoming weeks.
