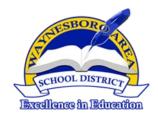


\$1.5 million contingency to cover potential for additional state revenue – funds would be used for Board-approved programs, special education needs, and/or future capital projects.



What is driving the expenditures year-over-year?

- Special education enrollment increased by 220 learners over the past 5 years.
- Over the course of the summer, we normally enroll 80 add. Special ed learners.
- Increased need for out-of-district placements for students due to special needs.
- Increased cost of health insurance for district employees and dependents
- Additional special education teachers, math coach, and elementary teachers due to enrollment.
- i-Ready Math program for grades K-5.
- Accessibility requests for capital projects.
- Capital project (roof) at CareerTech.
- Costs associated with rising labor rates and a shortage of teachers.



Why does this budget reflect a property mill increase?

District's current spending is already in bottom 1-2% of all PA schools Since Act 1 Index went into effect, WASD's taxes are 29 mills or 26% *lower* than permitted

WASD has the least amount of assessed property to tax per student in Franklin Cty

Fair Funding by State would increase student opportunities & provide taxpayer relief

Market Value Aid Ratio increased to 0.63 – highest in Franklin County Student to teacher ratio is already higher than peers and special education enrollment is increasing

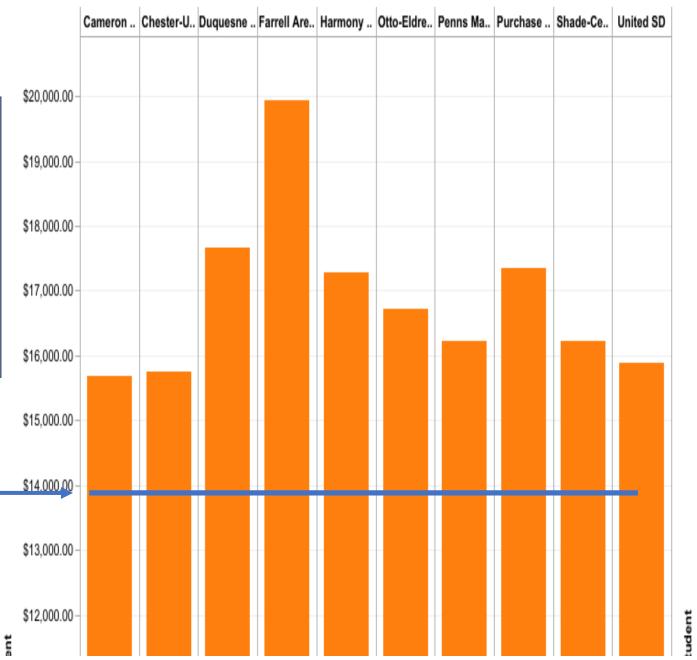
PA Basic Education Funding Commission calculates that WASD needs *\$25 million* more per year to meet adequacy gap.

2021-22 State Revenue per Student

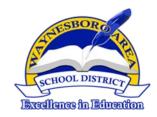


27 School Districts receive more state funding than Waynesboro spends! (This chart is just a sample.)

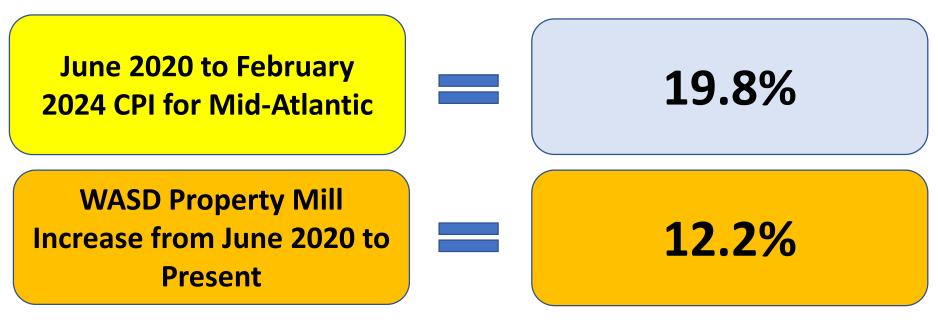
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Districts receive more State funding than we spend per student

Next Steps

Continue to review the budget with a focus on latest updates pertaining to staffing, expenditures, and revenues.

State funding may not be determined until post-June 30th.

PA Basic Education Funding Commission calculates that WASD needs *\$25 million* more per year to meet adequacy gap.

That funding would be both an educational and economic benefit to the community.
