

Opportunities to Earn College Credit at GMHS

There are five ways to pursue college credit at the high school:

- 1. College Career Pathway Program (CCP) through Asnuntuck Community College
- 2. College Connections Program through CT Community College System @Asnuntuck Community College (manufacturing technology, electronics and welding)
- 3. The Partnership Program Asnuntuck Community College
- 4. Advanced Placement Courses through the College Board
- 5. The Early College Experience (ECE) Program through the University of Connecticut

Why Pursue College Credits?

- Challenge/rigor in an area of study
- Skills practiced in high school help the transition to college expectations
- Favorably viewed in the college application process
- Financial Savings per credit hour to take classes in high school

HIGH SCHOOL→ COLLEGE →

Benefits While in College

- Register for college courses in an earlier cohort or other benefits associated with credits
- Allow student to take less college courses in a semester and not be behind (student athletes, illness, transition needs)
- Potentially graduate early/Obtain an additional minor/major and not add time.

The Connecticut Community College System

IMPORTANT UPDATE:

As of the Fall of 2023, Connecticut's 12 community colleges have consolidated into one singly accredited institution to sustain and enhance education quality, affordability and accessibility.

Individual campuses remain such as Asnuntuck (Enfield), Manchester or Capital (Hartford) however all are referred to as the Connecticut Community College.

College Board Advanced Placement: AP Program

Courses offered at the high school



- Students sit for the AP exam the first two weeks in May
 - Financial aid available for students who qualify
- Exam graded on a scale of 1 (low) to 5 (high)
- Consult with individual college/university re: AP test policy.
- Generally speaking, students need to earn a grade of 3,4, or
 5 on the AP Exam in order to qualify for college credit.

Advanced Placement Program "AP Courses"

GMHS is proud to offer 22 different AP courses across the curriculum.

College Connections Program CT Comm College @ Asnuntuck

- Tour the college to explore the program in spring of sophomore year and apply for junior and seniors years. <u>LINK</u>
- Select from one the following technical areas: electronics and mechatronics, machining, or welding.
- Granby pays the college tuition for students
- Applicants must be in good academic standing with credits/requirements
- Students attend GMHS periods 1-5, and attend the college periods 6-8
- Earn high school credits and college credits.
- College credits can be applied towards an associate degree following high school

College Career Pathway Program thru Asnuntuck

College credits can be earned through Asnuntuck by enrolling (and earning an 80 or better in grades 10, 11 or 12 in the following articulated GMHS courses:

Application is free, student must submit application in the semester the 2nd course is completed---no exception! Can't pull thru credit after the fact.

•Intro to Business and Personal Finance – 3 credits

•OR

- Intro to Business and Marketing 3 credits
- •Environmental Science 1 and 2 3 credits

Partnership Program through Connecticut Community College System

An opportunity for a high school to take a an entry level level course (up to four credits each semester) held at the community college.

Qualifications: high school junior or senior years with a high school average of B (80) or higher.

The course is *free of tuition and fees* but the family is responsible for the transportation to/from the college and the cost of books and materials.

Students earn college credit for a grade of C or better. This opportunity occurs at the beginning of the college fall and spring semesters.

Fall-Late August

Spring-January

UCONN Early College Experience Program



- Courses are offered @GMHS
- Student registers for the course in June of previous school year on the UCONN ECE Website and pay the tuition & fees
- LINK
- Student must earn a grade of C or better to receive university credit
- Credit is highly transferable to other colleges/universities across the USA "portable credit"
